

CHILDREN'S CORNER



At this time of year when it is cold and dull outside it is nice to have a little treat now and then. And what could be nicer than a steaming cup of hot chocolate after a day in the fresh air. Yum!

Ingredients for 4 cold people!

- 3 tbsp unsweetened cocoa powder
- 70g sugar
- o 1 litre milk
- ¼ tsp vanilla extract
- Miniature marshmallows



Method

- In a small bowl, blend the cocoa and sugar.
- In a medium saucepan heat the milk until little bubbles form around the edge of the pan. Do not let it boil.
- Stir a little of the hot milk into the cocoa mixture to loosen it up, and then pour the cocoa mixture into the hot milk in the saucepan. Add the vanilla and whisk until it is all blended together.
- Pour into mugs and top with the minimarshmallows.
- Wait until it has cooled so you don't burn your tongue!


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
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Thanks for Pieces of Eight and the trade adverts

Hello all in the Parish and happy New Year to all.

I wanted to say thank you for certain adverts in the Pieces of Eight magazine that you put out every month. When a problem arises one asks within one's social and work circles to see if anyone can give a recommendation to any trades people. If they are unable to help then our next port of call are the advertisements in Pieces of Eight. A while ago our chimney became blocked. Out came the Parish mag and a phone call later (mentioning Pieces of Eight of course) round came the Mears to fit a new cowl and sweep the chimney. We now have it done every year and would recommend R Mears & Sons to anyone who wanted a good chimney sweep.

So there we were at 4 o'clock on the Friday afternoon just before Christmas, the 21st of December to be honest. I noticed that the central heating radiators were still cold. the heating should have been on for a hour by now. The oil-fired boiler was still hot, as were the pipes around the boiler but the water circulation pump was rather quiet. Up until now it had been a rather noisy old pump. Out with Pieces of Eight and look for a heating engineer / plumber who is happy with oil-fired systems. I called J.T. Martin, again mentioning Pieces of Eight. I expected a reply to the effect of "I'll be there after Christmas to see what I can do" after all it was gone 4.30 by now. "I'll be there within an hour" was the cheerful reply. Jimmy duly arrived and had a look at the system. The pump was probably jammed was a diagnosis. Within an hour the heating was working but the pump probably wouldn't last much longer. "Call me if it fails again" said Jimmy. "I'll try not to call you Christmas morning" I said. We paid and Jimmy left us with this cheerful thought "If it fails, no matter when, call me!".

The next morning, Saturday the 22nd December, we awoke to a quiet heating system and a cold house. I sent a text "pump failed same as yesterday". We got a reply later in the morning saying Jimmy would be round with a new pump mid-afternoon. He arrived at three. By 6pm the heating was running with a quiet new pump and a radiator that had been cold and unheated for a couple of years was now warming up nicely. We paid and got our receipt once again and wished Jimmy a quiet Christmas.

The house has not been so warm in the last few years so the new pump was really needed. We have asked Jimmy to come around in the spring to give the whole system a check up. So two call-outs, a new pump, valves and a good few hours work and we think J.T. Martin has done a wonderful job and it hasn't cost the earth. Once again, I can't recommend Jimmy highly enough for his work and work ethic. Thank you to Pieces of Eight too, without you I wouldn't have found our plumber!

The archives and minutes of these early meetings make interesting reading as many of the veterans were fit young men at the time, not the old chap in a blazer selling poppies that we more readily think of. The branch wanted to make sure that these ancient minutes would be kept safely and have passed them for safe keeping to the Wadebridge Town Museum for display and archive.

It would therefore be sad to see such a long-standing organisation fall by the wayside but this has every possibility of happening if the Branch continues on its current course. Due to family, health and work commitment, three of the Wadebridge Royal British

Legion Branch Committee have had to resign recently. This has left the Branch without a Treasurer, Secretary or a Poppy Appeal Organiser. If these positions are not filled the Branch will be forced to either merge with another Branch (Bodmin perhaps) or to close completely and Lay Up the Standard that has been Paraded so proudly over all these years.

There will be an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Branch at the Churchill Bars Wadebridge at 7.30 pm on Monday the 21st of January. Knowing Your Place (a Personal Reflection)

Lifton Down, December 2002: the skies lowered above the glittering land spread out before me: inevitability was in the air. Even though I knew what Cornwall could hold, with its memories of interminable wet winters, pockets of social deprivation, combined with lack of job opportunities,

I still surrendered unconditionally.

I may have been made in Port Talbot, but from five years old, it was in Kernow and Fowey in particular that I was formed. There, by its river and among the streets and alley-ways, fields and lanes I had a very special childhood.

I had left Cornwall twice before: first in 1965, because of my dad's deteriorating ill-health and his decision that we leave our council Cornish unit, that it was 'time to get back home' to the extended family in Wales.

I found my way back in 1973, first to St. Dennis, where my own new family life began, then on to St. Newlyn East; only to leave Cornwall again in 1986 for a job among the rolling Gloucestershire Cotswolds.

So this was now my third return.

'Rather like a drowning man', as one of my musician friends succinctly put it.

If so, it was high-time I learned to swim again in this familiar sea, just like I had as a school-boy at Readymoney Cove.

Reflecting on my reasons 'why', I can pinpoint some key things:

a second marriage to someone whose life is based here, and therefore a need to renew my *personal* re-connection to this primal edge land, rich in artistic opportunity. This led in 2004, to my first solo exhibition, 'Dewhelans' ('Homecoming') in Penzance Gallery;

then there were all those years of touring with Brenda Wootton, through UK, Europe, and especially Australia where we sang and played in Sydney and Adelaide and memorably in Cornish for the Cornish at the Kernewek Lowender on the Yorke Peninsula:

and then there's the hand of friendship extended by my long-time fellow-musicians.

Also there's the unexpected:

discovering my long-buried ancestors in Gwinnear Churchyard;

the long summer afternoons Sue and I spent working the ground of Lanow, the 7th century monastic garden of the earliest settlement set within these undulating fields and wooded

streams, within the shade of the old walnut tree. Time had stood still down there.

But getting to know my place again has been hard. It's hardly Shangri-la.

Young people find it almost impossible to own a home of their own, and many still live with parents. There were no food-banks when I returned in '02; now there's one in every major town. They tell a story that's hard to deny.

And Fowey, the place I once thought I knew, is now hollowed out, like so many of our coastal communities.

The post office is gone, cinema gone, chapels converted into flats (just like my old 17th century Grammar School - how was that allowed?), old family business like the Varco's and Tippets all gone, and Fowey's last bank, bought by Gordon Ramsay, is being converted into more expensive apartments.

Today I picked up a shiny new copy of 'Cornwall Living', the free advertising magazine.

I didn't recognise the place they were selling. Instead I just had to walk the local lanes, clear my head, take in the sights and sounds of a cold winter's evening, where starlings swirl in vast murmurations on their way to Davidstow, and the cottage lights burn brightly through the gloom up Trequite, up Trelill.

True Kernow, old Kernow.

For me, it's a place I know in my heart.

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Orange-braised Pork Chops

A lovely warming dish for a winter's evening, and a reminder of summer.

Ingredients

- 4 loin pork chops or steaks
- o 2 level teaspoons flour
- ½ level tsp salt
- o 2 tablespoons oil
- o 1 tablespoons light soft brown sugar
- o Pinch of ground ginger
- Grated rind and juice of 3 oranges and a small amount of water
- Orange segments from 1 orange


- Put the chops in the bottom of an oven-proof dish
- Combine the sugar, ginger, orange rind and juice and water.
- Pour over the chops and cook in the oven for at 180 c for about 1 hour.
- 5 minutes before serving add the orange segments and place over the chops for serving.

Delicious served with sauté potatoes and a side salad.

Method

- o Coat the chops with flour and salt.
- Heat the oil in a frying pan and add the chops, browning them on both sides.

Our Feathered Friends

Time to wade into the new year with plenty of fresh air and walks as we wait in anticipation for Spring. Wade into waders as you stroll along the Camel Trail from Wadebridge towards Padstow. Catch the tide right and it brings thousands of wading birds towards the shoreline, all actively feeding as opposed to resting when the tide is high.

The Camel Estuary boasts a variety of wading birds at this time of year. If you appreciate a Starling murmuration then you will marvel at the thousands of Golden Plover that feed or rest up on the flats near Dinham, a flurry of wings flashing gold and white as they take flight high into the sky when disturbed at rest, twisting this way and that together. You can count many thousands of this wader at rest. Usually the Lapwing is close by - another pretty wader with a bright green and purple back and its crest proudly protruding above its head. Both these birds feed on farmland as well as mud-flats and estuaries. Plenty of other waders can be on show with Black-tailed Godwits alongside smaller numbers of Bar-tailed Godwits. Both feed with different actions - the Black-tailed Godwit probes deep in the mud with its long bill stretching forward, as opposed to the almost sewing machine needle probe nearer to its body of the Bar-tailed Godwit. Other larger waders to look out for are Oystercatchers, Knot, Grey Plovers, Redshanks, Snipe, Curlew, the occasional Ruff and Greenshank, and Green and Common Sandpipers. Rarer waders include the elegant Spotted Redshank and the RSPB logo bird the Avocet, however the Avocet is a very occasional visitor here - best to view these on the River Lynher if you get the wader bug!

Smaller waders present include Dunlin, Ringed Plover, and Sanderling (occasional), all very busy feeders, usually spotted on the water's edge. Dunlin can be seen in good numbers. All the waders feed in different ways and depths hence they are all happy feeding alongside each other - food for all!

Waders also come in various plumages to test the most experienced birder, juvenile, summer and winter plumages all mix together. Turnstones can also be seen, especially in Padstow harbour eating your chips, and the Purple Sandpiper near Constantine.

The Parish can boast a few waders on our territory-too with Lapwings and Golden Plover, Green Sand-pipers and Snipe seen around St Kew Parish, and especially Chapel Amble where most of the mentioned species can gather, and if you are lucky a wintering Woodcock. I have only scratched the surface here so please walk the Trail, with the added benefit of getting closer to nature, and usually friendly bird watchers with spotting scopes are willing to show and talk you through what they are looking at.

So grab a bird book and wade through the wader section, and become active in Wadebridge!

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

The View from the Allotments

..... and little has changed since I last wrote.

It's no excuse but a sort of lethargy (or is it just another I-word – laziness?) has overcome me lately and I/we have done very little on our plots. Nor have most people, admittedly, but that's no excuse.

The trouble is, if it's dry it's also windy or cold, and if it's not that then it's raining! And that means the ground is very hard to turn over, let alone rotavate.

I did put in some broad beans which had been growing in pots in the greenhouse and they are looking reasonably happy. Actually, most of them had been growing in the greenhouse and 3 of them had self-seeded on last year's bean plot and I transplanted them. Not always a recipe for success but they seem to have taken and I am keeping my fingers crossed.

I have done a bit of desultory tidying up – trimmed the loganberries, fidgeted with the vine, but nothing more and I am beginning to feel really guilty. The one thing I really must do now is to weed the asparagus plots so that the crowns have room to breathe. We ate quite a lot of our own asparagus last year and it is such a treat. Worth making an effort for.

We're really enjoying the brassicas this year and have harvested copious amounts of brussels sprouts, red kale, cavolo nero, and the start of some purple sprouting broccoli. And we appear to have some really healthy common-or-garden cabbages which are nearly ready to cut. What with them and the leeks and the parsnips, we should be OK through to April. And of course we are using our own onions all the time and very few of them have rotted, so we're well provided for.

At the moment we're receiving lots of seed catalogues, so the producers clearly think we should be doing SOMETHING! Maybe if we leaf through the offerings, it will spur us on to do a bit of clearing and tidying and planning what should go where this year. At least it will be a start.

We've got a couple of unexpected vacancies which we'd love to fill (people having to give up for health reasons or work) so please give me a ring if you would like to come over and have a look.

We have just welcomed another new plot-holder but would love to see every plot in use this year. Free water, free manure, a free shed to store all your bits and pieces – you'd be foolish not to take up the offer!

The Aftermath of the War

Demobilisation


Soldiers returning from the trenches found a different Britain to the one of 1914, with high unemployment, a rising cost of living, strikes from newly -organised Unions and a severe shortage of houses.

SOLDIER'S RETURN

A returning soldier was given a month's paid leave, still in the service of the military, after which he was officially demobilised. If he had not found a job he was given a small unemployment benefit for about 6 months. Beyond the first 6 months after demobilisation, if an ex-soldier could still not find a job they would have to join the dole queue. The unemployment

surance Act 1920 changed the law of 1911, raising the amount of dole money given and the number of workers who could claim, from 7 shillings to 15 shillings (20 shillings = £1 sterling) to a maximum of 15 weeks per year.

Demobilisation of the troops was done not by units but by individuals. Those with a long service record, longest time on the front line, or that were in pivotal jobs were to be sent home first. Pivotal jobs were in those industries which needed to be in full production to provide jobs for others. This plan was abandoned in 1919 when soldiers not in pivotal jobs protested at being sent back from leave to bases in France, Germany or Russia. 10,000 demonstrated in Folkestone; 8,000 in Brighton; and more in front of Whitehall. The process was too long and it was



too difficult to manage. Winston Churchill took over the planning of demobilisation, sending home first those who had arrived on the front first.

By February 1920 - 2 years after the Armistice there were still 125,000 men left to be demobbed.

The following poem was received from Mary Willcock (nee Northcott) stepsister to the late Molly Girvan. Apparently, it was written by a relative of Mary and Molly, who had served and survived the horrors of the Great War.

Tommy's Reward on your Service No Longer Required

The Kaiser Trained his Army the War he did declare. Then marched on Gallant Belgium before she could prepare.

But up jumped Jack and Tommy and crossed the raging main and drove those Hunish murderers back to Berlin again.

But now the war is over those lads you don't require While Tom was facing German in the bitter winters cold. You were facing Brilliant Ballroom and Diamonds set with Gold.

While Jack was facing dangers to try and get your bread You slept at home in safety on a snow white feather bed.

While we had a poultry sixpence with Bulley Beef and Jam. You dined in your beautiful Mansions on home fed Veal and Lamb.

But rich men please remember with the lad in navey blue we fought like hell in Flanders and won this war for you.

Remember we were promised good homes a little wealth But all Lloyd George has built Sir is Chequers for himself.

So while you sit in comfort besides for your fires glow Please try and help those Heroes who are tramping in the Snow

then rub out that old notice "Your Service we don't require and try and get us work Sir. And we find food and fire."

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

EDITORIAL

Once again, who would have thought or predicted that snow would fall so heavily and settle so quickly in the county as it did in at the end of January / early February. The settled snow always looks so peaceful and tranquil for the short time it is with us, I feel that it adds to the beauty of our already beautiful county. However, this weather as well as providing fantastic views, photography and outdoor activity opportunities can, and does, cause massive disruption.

Due to the time of day and the speed at which the snow settled it did indeed cause many problems and delays. I heard from a friend that it took almost nine hours to travel from Bude to Pendoggett, another told me that after eight hours trying to get home he had to abandon his car near Winnards Perch due to the road being blocked. 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
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
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Cornwall's 'Little Harbour'


Overall 10 bags have been collected on Beachcare days, and a total of 16 overall.

NB not suitable for anyone with a nut allergy!


Ingredients:

- Cupcake papers or yoghurt pots
- String

How to make:

- Make a hole in the bottom of the cupcake paper or yoghurt pot.
- o Thread through the string and make a loop and knot it so it is secure.
- Melt the suet over a gentle heat.
- When it has melted pour it into a jug and add the dry ingredients. Mix well.
- Fill the cupcake papers or yoghurt pots.
- Place them in the fridge until they have set.
- o Hang them outside, where cats and dogs can't reach them.

Climate Change

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Crispy chicken burgers with lemon mayo

Ingredients

- 4 chicken breasts
- o 3 slices white bread, toasted
- 1 egg
- o 1 tsp Dijon mustard
- o Zest of 1 lemon, and juice of half
- o 4 tbsp reduced-fat mayonnaise
- 4 ciabatta buns, warmed or toasted
- Your choice of salad to serve

Method

- Heat grill to high. Put the chicken breasts between two pieces of cling film and bash with a rolling pin until they are about half their original thickness.
- Whizz the toast in a food processor to rough breadcrumbs, then tip onto a plate.
- Beat the egg and mustard together in a bowl and season. Dip the chicken into the egg, letting the excess drip back into the bowl, then press into the toasty breadcrumbs.

- Put under the grill on a flat baking sheet and grill for about 10 minutes, turning once until golden and crisp on both sides and the chicken is cooked through.
- Beat the lemon zest and juice and lots of black pepper into the mayonnaise. Spread some of the mayo onto the bottom halves of the buns, top with chicken breast and salad of your choice, and serve.

Our Feathered Friends

"Feed the birds, tuppence a bag", so the song goes. More like a small fortune if this season has been anything to go by! Joking apart, there are many ingredients and means that the suppliers of wild bird food offer us bird lovers to tempt us to part with our money. It pays to buy the best food you can purchase for your budget. Cheaper bird food, however tempting, tends to include added extras like odd stalks and grasses or crunched up dog biscuits, and cheaper larger seeds that only pigeons and pheasants tend to eat, but only as a last resort! Some bird food can lead to hygiene issues leaving a mess in your garden and around feeders which encourages a vermin issue.

Peanuts seem to be out of favour in our garden compared to other temptations. Sunflower hearts are enjoyed, they are good too for not leaving a mess as the birds can eat them quickly with no effort to prise them open and discard the waste. 'No grow, no waste' seed blends can be a good option to buy to keep weeds out!

Niger seeds attract Goldfinches, sunflower seeds and good quality seed also attract other Finches. We get a Greenfinch pair feeding which is rewarding as their numbers are in decline.

Fat balls and fat pellets, and slabs with various ingredients that fit into special wire or plastic feeders are welcomed by a whole host of species. These offer a good source of energy for the eager feeders. Great Spotted Woodpeckers and the Tit family en-

joy these and you may be lucky enough to attract a Nuthatch.

Different styles of feeders that hold various treats including ground mesh holders are available. Indeed you can turn your garden into a fast-food chain restaurant if you can afford to get carried away!

Natural ingredients like apples and pears are good for Thrushes and Blackbirds, as is suet for Robins and Dunnocks. Buying bird food is not just for birds, but also rewards us as we sit back and enjoy the comings, goings and behaviour of birds attracted to the garden - Rooks attempting to be a Blue Tit holding its wings out to balance on feeders, for example.

Interestingly, a Jay at Walmsley Bird Sanctuary investigating the seed feeders latched onto the feed holder briefly prior to unbalancing. The Jay is part of the crow family, a bird that has a very loud rasping call announcing danger at the edge of woodlands.

The Jay is a handsome bird, with a white crown and black stripes, black moustache, pale pinkish grey body, white rump and electric blue bars within black and white wings. A rare visitor to our garden, but often seen on the road leading from Pendoggett to the St Kew Inn (mines a pint!). Remember at this time of year you can cut back feeding as more natural wild food sources become available.

Happy hygiene is happy feeding - don't forget, clean feeders regularly.

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
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St. Kew Community Gardens Association

The View from the Allotments and I could almost repeat what I wrote last month.

It's not just us – I met some fellow tenants in Wadebridge last week and they admitted with a grimace that they had hardly been near the place in the past five or six weeks, and their plot is one of the neatand-tidy ones!

However, the ground does seem to be drying out a bit and I hope (after seeing a bit of sunshine and warmth in the past few days) that I shall have enough impetus to get things moving. At the moment I go round there a couple of times a week but that's just to get some vegetables for dinner. The brussels sprouts are continuing their success, the purple sprouting broccoli has started with a vengeance and, of course, we're lifting leeks and parsnips regularly which is always gratifying. But I must, must, MUST get started on preparing various patches for the new season.

The really good news is that people have been reading our articles, and in the past month we have had requests from three people to join the site and take over one or more plots. It looks as though we might almost have a full house by the time we get to Easter, although there might still be two vacancies, if anyone's interested.

One of the things we shall have to get down to soon is the replacement of the green netting fence around our two plots. When we (or rather, Tony)

erected it some four or five years ago, it looked super efficient and sturdy and made the whole place look cared for. Now, however, after several seasons of high winds and torrential rain, it is in a sad state, drooping in places, missing in others and needs a ruthless approach. We need to get rid of it all and start again. But it has been such a help in sheltering young plants when they are first planted out and will be worth the effort.

It's also time to clean out the greenhouse, take up the old grow-bags and scatter the contents across parts of the plot and generally sort through all the seed-trays and plant-pots to see what can be salvaged for the next lot of plants. And of course that sort of job can be done even if it's raining and blowing outside. The greenhouse has really stood up to some awful weather but Tony built it very carefully and it has repaid us.

Off now to meet a couple of people who want to look at vacant plots and then I shall make up a bagful of veg. for dinner tonight and tomorrow. I shall also put together a bag of greens for Steve Randall at the Red Lion to use with Sunday Lunch at the pub – local veg. from a local producer! Can't beat it!

The two people I showed round yesterday have just stopped by with a completed tenancy agreement and are raring to go – renting not one but two plots, side-by-side. Yay! Result.

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ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

February 1919

Snippets

Bagpipers

Over a thousand pipers died during World War 1. These extraordinary men were sitting ducks as they went over the top to pipe their men into battle. They stood in full view of the German lines, playing their instruments, marching through "no-man's land" without any sort of ammunition but their sounds. They were paid an extra penny a day. Piper Harry Lunan, of the 5th Gordon Highlanders, was the last surviving piper and he said, "I just played whatever came into my head, bit I was worried about was tripping on the uneven ground, which interrupted my playing. The enemy fire was murderous; the men were falling all around me. I was lucky to survive. Hearing the pipes gave the troops courage. French enjoyed the pipes, they couldn't get enough. The German's were scared of the pipes." Harry Lunan died in Canada in 1994, aged 98. For centuries the noise of the pipes has struck fear



into the hearts of the enemy soldiers. Other British Commonwealth troops – New Zealanders, Austral-



ians, and Canadians – used the pipes as well. Indian troops also used bagpipes and drums. Eventually, no country lost more people in combat, as a proportion of population, than Scotland.

Ladies of the Manor

In all of the peers and their sons under the age of 50 who served in the war almost 1 in 5 was killed. During those final years 6 peers and 65 peers' sons died as a result of the hostilities, 24 of them aged 25 or less. In many cases, after the war, titles passed direct from grandfather to grandson, and many family lines died out altogether. The landed gentry were not content with offering only their sons to the war effort, they also offered up their homes as well.

Many mansions were converted into hospitals and convalescent homes to cater for military casualties, or to act as temporary lodgings for the Belgian refugees who streamed out of their stricken country in 1914. By the end of the war accommodation had been found for about 100,000 of them.

Reflections

Easter this year is very late, falling on 21st April. In consequence the month of March falls almost entirely within Lent beginning with Ash Wednesday on March 6th. The term Lent is a secular one, meaning Spring, and so we can look forward to natural renewal and growth occurring at this time.

In Church terms Lent is a period of preparation lasting forty days recalling the time spent by Jesus in the desert as he prepared himself psychologically and spiritually for his mission on earth.

We traditionally associate Lent with giving things up, fasting or at least reducing our intake of food and drink. This is not a bad way to prepare for the feasting we associate with the celebration of Easter, but we would do better (and probably have greater chance of success) if we regard Lent as a period of

growth and renewal, in which we deliberately choose to develop our spiritual sensibilities. We can follow a course of study by attending a Lent group, or reading a recommended Lent book. But equally beneficial can be a more regular reading of the Bible and more careful attention to our dealings with our friends and neighbours. The latter may be especially relevant this year as the possible significance of March 29 creates political tensions.

Whatever we choose to do to signal Lent it is perhaps more important *that* we choose to do something, anything, to emphasise its special nature than *what* we choose to do.

Mr Philip Rodda from Rodda's Cornish Cream came along to tell of the history of the family's business.

He began with a TSW video which had been broadcast round 20 years ago. It gave us the story of his great-grandmother who began offering her cream to visitors. Her daughter-in-law worked out how to lengthen the life of the cream and it was sent to London in glass jars packed in straw.

It was sold to Fortnum & Mason in the early 1930's, now it goes to Dubai, Hong Kong and Sweden. Philip not only spoke of their Creamery, but also of life in general in Scorrier, The Creamery had offered work to local people although cream making stopped during World War 2. Milk now is purchased from within a 30 mile radius of the creamery, and there are other products such as milk, fudge, short-

bread, crème fraiche, custard and butter. Look in your local stores and try some lovely local produce.

It was such an informative evening, Philip was an excellent speaker.

In March we have our Annual General Meeting on Wednesday 13th March in the Community Hall. This will be a short meeting followed by a general activity session and plenty of refreshments. Come along and find out about the Women's Institute.



The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall, St Kew Churchtown at 7.00pm on the second Tuesday of each month. Members of the public are welcome to attend and address the meeting on any subject of concern.

St Kew Parish Council Meeting, held on Tuesday 12th February at 7.00 pm in the Parish Hall.

Present: Chairman A Godden, Councillors T Mott, R Godden, J Rowe, B. Finnemore, P Bishop and 10 members of the public.

The Council have heard that the times of the Post Office stop at St Kew Highway on Thursdays have changed. This is because they have added another stop in their rounds which means that the times alter. The new times are 14.00 to 15.00.

The road in Churchtown St Kew that has been undermined by the stream is going to be repaired at last, work is scheduled to begin on the 1st of April.

The salt bin at the junction of Church Terrace and Barton Row in St Kew has been stolen, just when it was needed in the cold snap. Would you all keep an eye out for a bright yellow bin with St Kew Parish Council on it please. These bins are not cheap!!

The Council has been approached by a company which helps with preparing a Parish Plan. The Council will enquire about the cost, discuss it at the next meeting in March, and a decision will be made whether the Council will make a Parish Plan.

The condition of the roads is of national concern, but if anyone knows of a local road defect (pot hole, mud, blocked drain, etc) you can report it on-line at www.cornwall.gov.uk/transport-and-streets/roads-highways-and-pavements/report-a-problem-with-a-road-highway-or-footway, or by phone on 0300 1234 222, or phone any Councillor. Let's try to keep our roads safe and tidy.

The Council has had the footpath from the lower churchyard in St Kew to the upper churchyard cut back.

The Council undertakes to cut all the footpaths in St Kew at least once a year. This cannot start before the 1st of June to avoid disturbing nesting birds, some paths will inevitably get a little overgrown but this cannot be helped. We also cut and maintain all the common land in the parish.

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

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

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
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St Kew Annual Parish and Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Every parish is legally required to hold an annual Parish Meeting to elect churchwardens, and an annual Parochial Church meeting to conduct other parish church business.

The St Kew Annual Parish and Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be held on Monday 29th April 2019 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall.

Any member of the Electoral Roll of the Civil Parish, or someone on the Electoral Roll of the Parish Church can attend and vote."

Church Electoral Rolls: The preparation of a new Church Electoral Roll takes place every six years, and is due this year.

The minutes of AGM No 9, March 2018 were accepted (proposed by Jim Godden, seconded by Barry Cuff. Chairman's, Treasurer's and Archivist's reports were presented and accepted by all present.

All current members of the committee stood for re-election and, following thanks for the previous year from President Mr Jim Godden, an election for new committee was held. Without opposition or objections, and with no other candidates, the following committee was elected:

Chairman: Mrs. Sandy Chadwick Archivist: Ms. Kim Appleby Secretary: Mr John Raybould

Joint acting Treasurers: Kim Appleby and John

Raybould.

Committee members elected:

Mr Barry Cuff Mr Thom. Chadwick Ms. June Bentley Mrs. Judy Gray

Life President, Mr Jim Godden, also serves as committee member and vice chairman.

Following the election, the following proposals were discussed:

- a) Due to a continuing lack of a permanent treasurer, John and Kim will continue to hold the reins of finance.
- b) It was deemed from financial statements prepared by John and Kim that we should be in a better financial situation: Listed members not attending or paying annual subscriptions, increased costs involved in holding talks and visits, increased costs of subscriptions to outside bodies, and the cost of maintaining our archives, means that our financial situation is precarious, but not irredeemable.
- c) A proposal from the Chairman was to increase membership fees from £12.00 to £15.00 pa. This was seconded by Tom and voted upon, with an 8 to 2 majority in favour. This step is now taken for the year to March AGM 2020.

If more members attend talks and visits, more nonmembers arrive (this fee is still £3.00 per person), and our funds are boosted to future proof the St Kew Historical Society then a reconsideration could follow in 2020.

d) We have no intention of winding up the Society, but in fact plan to improve our facilities and presentations, BUT we cannot do this without the support of our members, not just our committee.

Our Feathered Friends

'Twitch' way did that bird go? As I write this a longstaying scarce migrant bird is in residence in Chapel Amble. The Temminck's Stint has been reported on the same field areas since New Years Eve.

A small wader about the size of a Robin, this neat little bird is enjoying the hospitality of the fields in front of the car park, and the flooded meadows behind the pub. This wader should be in Africa where it spends the winter months prior to migrating (shhh don't tell it, you might upset it!). The Temminck's breeds in the arctic tundra regions which is a quite impressive migration considering its size. The bird has been the centre of attention for a lot of twitchers and birders alike!

Garden bird watching can introduce new people to the hobby and can whet the appetite to venture further afield to seek out new birds for your listing needs, be it yearly, local, county, life, etc. Adopting a local patch is a good step for watching and recording regular, seasonal and behaviour activities in a different habitat to your garden. Listing species, numbers, and breeding evidence can also be useful in year-on-year comparisons of trends, losses, and gains, just like the RSPB's garden bird survey. You are a 'birder' and not a 'twitcher' at this stage!

I am often referred to as a twitcher by non-birding types. A twitcher is someone who goes to great lengths to view a new bird, which can involve monitoring bird hot spots, liaising with fellow twitchers, and viewing bird sites on the internet which flag up the latest bird sightings. They drive many miles,

sometimes through the night for many hours. Some even charter boats and planes in their quest to be on top of their game with an impressive sightings list. They can also become obsessed, stressed, motivated, deflated, rewarded, irritable, tired, patient, competitive, tearful and broke! The list goes on - I know as I have been there!

Thus birding at Chapel Amble provides great habitat and seasonally rewarding bird watching, the village also has the Walmsley bird sanctuary backing onto it, has plenty of wetland areas, tree cover, reed beds and the river. Chapel Amble is a great patch to adopt. Waders, small song birds, waterfowl and owls, can all be recorded throughout the year.

Spring migrants such as the Reed and Sedge Warblers return to the reed areas in late Spring and give you a good challenge to spot the song differences!

A pair of Tawny Owls flew over my car on my last Owl watch, and a Barn Owl has also been spotted, so perhaps put the parish on the map and watch for yourselves.

'Twitch' way to go? I chose being the birder, happily finding common, and occasionally rare birds (but also the odd 'twitch' – remember the Glossy Ibis in Chapel Amble a few years ago?). I didn't find it but was thrilled to see it! Remember to follow the country code and familiarise yourselves with the bird watchers code too.

Happy patch-watching or, if you want to live on the edge, happy twitching!


Overall 15 bags collected on Beachcare days, 21 reported in total.

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St. Kew Community Gardens Association

The View from the Allotments and at last things seem to be moving forward a little.

During the fine and dry spell towards the end of February (remember that?) we actually settled down to do a bit of clearing and tidying and weeding. Tony has rotavated a strip of one plot and has dug up most of the old sweetcorn root boles (you wouldn't believe how difficult it is to lift these. I did a few and couldn't manage more than five at a time), and also some old gooseberry bushes which are past their usefulness.

And I did as promised, and weeded the asparagus beds and also tidied up around the trellises we had put in for peas. Now we are beginning to see where things can go this season and with this in mind we have ordered (and taken delivery this morning) of a whole lot of seeds and onion sets. I am the onion queen in our household and have already earmarked which strip I want Tony to rotavate next, as I like to get my sets in by the end of March if possible.

I've also cleared out the greenhouse and spread the left-over growbags over one strip on the plot. We're debating whether to grow tomatoes in the greenhouse this year, or to find instead a sheltered, south-facing spot for them. The greenhouse gets very hot indeed at times - despite painting the glass over, leaving the door and windows open at all times, and copious watering - last year's tomatoes Weren't Happy! But of course, finding a "sheltered" spot isn't so easy either, so we shall have to put our thinking-caps on. Maybe we'll just keep the greenhouse for planting seeds and growing the seedlings

on at the beginning of the season. And perhaps it would be better to grow tomatoes in the shelter of our little garden here in Kenwyn. We'll see.

We're not going to be too ambitious this year and haven't bought quite so many packets of seeds. However, we can always get more if we change our mind. As usual, we shall grow lots of different brassicas, as these are the things which, together with the leeks and parsnips, see us through to the end of April each year.

I want to mention here the "bible" we use, and have used for many years – The Vegetable Expert by Dr. D. G. Hessayon. It's the best book I have ever come across for vegetable-growing and I refer to it all the time – when to plant, how deep, how far apart, when to crop, how to store – in fact everything you might want to know, There's a companion book, too, called The Garden to Kitchen Expert which includes, as you might guess, recipes to go with the various veggies and this, too, is a useful tome.

Now, of course, we've had torrential rain and high winds again so all my plans to get on with the gardening have come to nothing. Would YOU want to be digging out there in this weather?

The weather forecast looks a bit more hopeful for the next couple of weeks though, so I am keeping fingers crossed. Then in the next article I can boast about all the stuff we've done: onions in, seedlings coming on, and so on. Maybe!

OUR MAGNIFICENT NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE

In 2012, a routine CAT scan revealed a small aneurysm, or bubble, on my aorta - the big artery supplying the lower body. This was monitored every six months by ultra-sound scans. The November 2018 scan revealed that it had grown quite quickly so that alarm bells rang in the NHS Vascular system.

On January 24th this year I woke in the middle of the night with what I thought was indigestion. We'd had friends in the night before so I wasn't too surprised. I prodded the offending area and discovered that I was able to feel a pulsating lump in my tummy below my ribs. Ooops!

I rang Port Isaac and after stressing the urgency of the situation and was able to get an almost immediate appointment with Dr Garland. After feeling my tummy, he and his system went into overdrive. He said "I'm afraid we'll have to admit you!". I was in an ambulance, siren and blue lights, destined for Treliske by 10.45, and there by 11.30. I had had a CAT scan by 12.15 and met my vascular surgeon at 12.30. I was under the knife by 14.30 and by 18.30 was in bed, in a ward and awake. There had been a surgeon, a theatre, a 12 person team, all the equipment and spare parts, a ward and a bed available. Quite incredible.

Two days after a major abdominal operation (keyhole surgery) I walked out of hospital and got into a friend's car. By 17.30 on the 26th January I was at home; the fantastic team had put a stent in my aorta and the only discomfort I had was from a 1" incision in each groin; paracetamol and one aspirin a day was the only medication I needed.

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Hot Cross Scones - a lovely Easter treat.

Makes 8. Takes 15 minutes to make, and 15 minutes to bake.

Ingredients

- 225g self raising flour, plus a little extra for dusting.
- o 75g butter, softened.
- o 40g light muscovado sugar.
- 75g small sultanas.
- o 50g mixed peel.
- 4 tbsp milk, plus extra for brushing.
- o 50g plain flour.
- o 2 tbsp caster sugar.
- o 1tsp mixed spice.
- 1 egg.

Method

- o Pre-heat the oven to 220 °c, gas 7.
- Sift the flour into a large bowl. Rub in the butter with the finger tips and then stir in the muscovado sugar, sultanas, peel and spice.

- In a jug, beat together the egg, milk and a pinch of salt. Pour into the flour mixture and bring together to make a soft dough.
- o Roll out the dough, no thinner than 2cm.
- Using a 4cm cutter, stamp out rounds without twisting. Re-roll the trimmings and stamp out more. Place on a baking sheet and brush with milk.
- Make the crosses by mixing together the plain flour and 1-2 tablespoons water and roll to a smooth dough.
- Roll out and cut into thin strips. Put a cross on the top of each scone, brush with milk, then bake for 15 minutes until well risen and golden.
- For the glaze, dissolve the caster sugar in 2 tablespoons of water. Brush the tops of the scones with the mixture as soon as they come out of the oven.
- Cool slightly on a rack and eat whilst still warm split and spread with butter, or leave to cool and serve with jam and clotted cream.

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LEST WE FORGET

April 2019

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC).

This month it is the 70th Anniversary of the death of the person who brought the CWGC into being. Fabian Arthur Goulstone Ware was born at Clifton, Bristol on 17 June 1869 and, *inter alia*, became a school master, Director of Education for the Transvaal, and Editor of the *Morning Post*.

In the Great War he commanded a mobile unit of the British Red Cross serving with the French army. His unit's task was to search for British wounded and missing in the district which had been over-run by the Germans during the retreat from Mons, and to convey them back to British lines or to a British base.

He soon recognised the need both to locate and record the graves of soldiers killed in action. In 1915 the War Office officially recognised his registration commission and, in 1917, by Royal Charter, the Imperial War Graves Commission (IWGC) - later the Commonwealth War Graves Commission - was charged with undertaking the reburial of the fallen soldiers of Britain and her empire in permanent cemeteries.

At the end of the war there was the enormous task of recording the details of the dead. By 1918 some 587,000 graves had been identified and a further 559,000 casualties were registered as having no known graves.

Fabian Ware devoted his time exclusively to the Commission throughout the 1920s and 1930s. He was knighted in 1922. During the second world war he combined his IWGC duties with those of Director-General of graves registration and inquiries.

Sir Fabian Ware died on 28 April 1949 in Branwood House Hospital, Gloucester, and is buried in the Holy Trinity Churchyard, Amberley, Gloucestershire. His grave has a CWGC style headstone.

To quote A.J.A. Morris in his book on Major-General Sir Fabian Arthur Goulstone Ware: "It was Ware's inspiration, imagination, dedication, and determination combined with considerable diplomatic skill and political finesse that ensured that throughout the world there are cemeteries, quiet, dignified, immaculately maintained, welcomingly familiar in the guise of English gardens, providing a permanent and fitting reminder of the individual's sacrifice made by British and dominion service personnel in two world wars.



AN EARLY EASTER MESSAGE

'Early, on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb.'

...while it was still dark - a reminder that Resurrection comes, not, as the saying is 'out of a clear blue sky' but out of darkness; out of the darkness of the night; out of the darkness of despair, out of the darkness of sorrow, pain, abandonment and grief. And even more astonishingly, Resurrection comes out of the darkness of death.

We've only to look at Easter cards to see that Easter is most often illustrated as a festival of the morningwith bright sunshine, flowers and lambs frolicking and there's nothing wrong with this, for the visible return of Spring raises all our spirits.

But we need also to be aware that the natural symbolism of Spring may so dominate the Easter celebrations that the Easter message may lose its radical character, its cutting edge.

For the reality we experience in the natural world is death and decay - while Easter proclaims the opposite; Out of desolation and despair, out of wickedness and cruelty, out of the anguish and agony of the cross comes victory. In raising Christ from the dead, God has done a totally new thing, has performed an act of new Creation.

Here indeed is good news and especially today for those who're experiencing illness, pain and sorrow; those of our sisters and brothers who are at this moment being nailed to the cross in places of famine, conflict and natural disaster in our world; it's good news for those for all who're mourning the death of dear ones, whether of lives cut short by illness or combat; it's good news for all who are experiencing human cruelty, oppression and injustice.

For the God of Easter is the God who shares in human suffering, who in Christ Jesus has drunk to the full the cup of suffering and drained it to its dregs. Good news indeed!

How our Foodbank helps our community

As a nation, we don't expect anyone to be left hungry or destitute. There may be many reasons why someone

can find themselves in crisis; illness, disability, family breakdown or the loss of a job can happen to any one of us.

Food Donations

We receive kind donations from local schools, churches, businesses, organisation and individuals. The impact of a donation is huge, we see first-hand how it can help restore dignity and revive hope.

Food is sorted and stored

We have around 30+ volunteers who give up their time to sort the food and make food boxes. They also provide a free hot drink, a listening ear and additional support where needed to help break the cycle of poverty.

Professionals identify people in need.

So how does it work? Our Foodbanks work with a variety of professional services who hold our Red Vouchers, such as social workers, schools, doctors, housing officers, health visitors, Children's Centres, mental health workers or Citizens Advice to name a few. If you are not in contact with anyone, we can signpost you so that we know that you will get the best possible support with your specific crisis. Our Foodbanks are committed to providing people with 3 days' worth of nutritionally balanced food, in exchange for a foodbank voucher.

A Fisherman's Story...

Spring in Cornwall sounds wonderful. People spend time in our wonderful county but living and working here can be a challenge. Last Spring, after a harsh spell of relentless wind and rain and the 'Beast from the East' the foodbank had a visit from a very reluctant customer.

He was a fisherman who had been going to sea since he was 12 years old. He lived in a tiny fisherman's cottage

but even that was proving too expensive to heat. When the weather took a turn for the worse, the fishing boats were unable to get out to sea. By the time he plucked up courage to come to us he hadn't eaten for days, had run out of money for light, heat and cooking and in his words couldn't understand how he had been 'reduced to this'. We sat together, had a cup of tea, a chat and talked things over.

Thanks to local people helping their community, we sent him off with food and hygiene products for him and food for his dog. The following week he came back to see us and seemed a different man. He had a spring in his step and was pleased to say a skipper had called him to say they would be going to sea at the end of the week. If you would like to donate, we are in need of long-life fruit juice, rice, toiletries, toilet rolls, washing-up liquid, washing powder and household cleaning items (no bleach please).

Additional Help

Emergency food is the first step in helping many people access other services and support which can help get their lives back on track. We are currently working with Cornwall Housing and Eccabi as part of the European Social Fund Programme running the FREE Money Box courses which help with confidence building, budgeting and managing finances. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you'd like further information about this.

The Blacksmith's Trough of Pendoggett.

Reference the historically interesting well-written piece by Patrick Mewton in last month's edition, "Historic Village trough returned to Pendoggett". Attached is a photograph of the trough – bottom right in the photograph – when it was in use by George Henry Thyer when he became the village smithy in 1912.

Patrick Mewton, whose family has long connections with Pendoggett, is to be congratulated, together with the other community-minded individuals, on the detective work and persistence in ensuring the trough was returned to where it belongs in Pendoggett.

Not only did he organise the celebration he also got relatives to attend (some are now living in the village) of another Pendoggett smithy James Henry Finnemore.

The original picture is held by Kim Appleby, Archivist of the St Kew History Society. In 1912 the Thyer family were living at "Lydcott",

opposite the Cornish Arms, with the forge and the trough, to the left of the house, now modern homes. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the History Society received more snippets of information, which, through modern technology, can be researched and thus open up the past for the enjoyment of us all. The View from the Allotments

..... getting boring, isn't it?

I wish I could point to great swathes of land under cultivation and seedlings coming up all over the place but I can't. I don't know how other allotment sites are faring, but this winter's weather seems to have disheartened us all. Every time we have one dry day and think "tomorrow I might tackle the", the next day it's pouring with rain again and all hope of digging or rotavating is gone.

Actually we did make a start about ten days ago and went at it with a will, lifting all the old brassicas, the (very heavy and awkward) maize plants and putting the parsnips into a sort of clamp for storage. We fully intended going round again the next day to carry on the good work, but no luck. Rain again.

We did a little wander round the site yesterday (no rain!) to see that several of our members have actually started to turn over their plots and make use of the excellent manure that we buy from Graham Tiplady. I noticed that a couple of plots have clearly been put under potatoes, as you can see the mounding up of the rows. Apart from that not much is going on.

We had a check on the greenhouse, which has stood up well to the winds and have decided that weather or no, now is the time to put some seeds in trays and start thinking ahead to the planting.

Tony is getting some special covered seed trays which work without constant watering, which means that we can leave them on their own from time to time. Of course, since the greenhouse is DRY we can get on with that, weather or no. In the meantime we have received our onion sets through the post and I am aiming to get them in well before the end of the month. So we shall have to have at least one small section rotavated and raked over in the next ten days or so, even if we get soaked in the process.

I really hope I can write in a month's time of hard work and RESULTS – keep fingers crossed!

There are still four vacant plots by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them. We plan to have them rotavated too, so they are a much more attractive proposition for prospective tenants. Do please get in touch.

Bring back the crib bag! (update from a litter-picker)



I'm delighted that the Parish Council is considering an organised litter-pick, and hope as many people get involved (one way or another) as possible.

Perhaps it could count towards volunteering (Duke of Edinburgh participants), community projects (parish organisations – do we have any Brownies or Scouts?), or the lone dog walker that would like to enjoy a plastic-free countryside. If none of these tick your boxes, perhaps a greater commitment to always binning your rubbish; and expecting family/friends to do the same might be your thing. Did you know it takes 12 years for a cigarette butt to disintegrate, and 450 years for a plastic bottle!

One thing I've noticed since litter-picking my local stretch of road is that I have a far greater sense of pride in keeping it litter-free. It doesn't take much effort to stop the car (in a safe spot) or pause on a dog walk, to pick up a lone crisp packet (now known

as pick-it-up-yoga!) This also discourages more litter being flung out of other passing vehicles – somehow rubbish breeds more rubbish: if people see litter on the road they seem to think it absolves them of responsibility for their own litter-louting.

The vast majority of 'fresh litter' I've collected is lunch-on-the-go items (drink cans/bottles, branded coffee cups, crisp and sweet wrappers along with occasional sandwich/pasty/chip bags). I reckon these things have been picked up en-route during the working day, and tossed out of the vehicle window as convenience food is consumed. Works traffic passing through the parish obviously rate the state of their car interior over the countryside, how we educate them I'm unsure. I'm tempted to start a 'bring back the crib bag' campaign so everyone takes their lunch-litter home!

Those parishioners who are on the current list will be accepted for the 2018 list unless they ask to be removed. If there is anyone in the Parish who wishes to be placed on the Church Electoral Roll for the first time should contact Andrew Campbell for a registration form.

It would be appreciated if all completed forms be returned, or left in the church, as soon as possible, certainly before the date of the APCM, which is on Monday 30th April at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall.

- o Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Remove from the heat and remove the thyme sprigs.
- Season to taste, and stir in the yoghurt.
- o Pour the soup into warmed bowls and scatter with the chopped spring onions.
- Serve with chunks of good crusty bread.

Delicious as a warming supper on a chilly evening.

Method

- Heat the oil in a saucepan, and fry the red onions and shallots for 20 - 30 minutes stirring frequently until golden and caramel-
- o Stir in the flour and mustard, and cook gently for 2 minutes.





ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

March/ April 1918

From The Parish Magazine.

Extract from the Vicar's entry – "... Notwithstanding the severe weather of Easter Day, both our 7 and 8 o'clock celebrations of the Holy Communion (when we especially remembered our absent soldier boys) were well attended, some coming several miles in the wet to make their communion... At this supremely critical moment in the history of our Empire, when the future of humanity hangs in the balance, when our heroic men are courageously holding the line of defence against fearful odds, when thousands are making the great sacrifice, - let us daily beseech the Lord of Hosts to have mercy upon us, and to stretch forth His Arm to help and defend us... The whole day, with its recollections and bright services, brought us very near to those we are thinking much of at the present moment, and made us feel in God's good time the agony of the world's calvary will be followed by the exultant joy of the children of God because of the overthrow of the powers of evil, and the final triumphant purposes of God."

"Easter Vestry Meeting. – Owing to the Vicar, as a member of the V.T.C. [Voluntary Training Corps] being on parade for General Inspection on Easter Monday, the Vestry Meeting is postponed till Friday, 5th inst., at 7.30, when our report and financial statement will be presented."

"Our Day School Children have knitted several pairs of Navy blue socks for Mrs Jackson, who sends them on to Mrs Roy Jackson for distribution to our wounded sailors. The children's work, under Miss Mehennick, is much appreciated."

"A Lecture in the Institute [Every Institute, now a private house] on "War-time and Domestic Cooking" was given by Miss Reece. There was quite a large number present, and some valuable hints and receipts were carried away by those present."

Home Front

Despite the imposition of rationing on the nation, it was reported in the national press that, because the throwing of rice at weddings was not banned, there were reports that groups of youths were going round the churchyards picking up individual grains of rice to feed their chickens.

The British dealt with the rationing with humour. A typical joke was: When the charlady turned up to do her half day, the mistress was a little disconcerted by her smile of welcome. "Why Eliza", she said, "What have you done with your teeth?" "Well, mum", replied the charlady, "We ain't goin' to 'ave anyfin' to chew until the war's over, so I've pawned 'em."

Rationing in Germany was also a problem for the Germans. It is said their system for controlling the food distribution was flawed. Everyone was issued with tickets, but the wealthy bought up supplies on the black market, leaving the poor with nothing but tickets.

Western Front

In their second major offensive, the Germans drove for Ypres and the chance to reach the important channel ports. Depleted British units which had been involved in the fighting the previous month, were stationed on what was seen as a 'quiet sector'. However, understrength Portuguese troops, who were in the line, suffered heavy casualties when the Germans broke through; therefore, Allied reserves were hastily moved to stem the tide. Since the French did not have any spare troops to send to the British Expeditionary Forces they were on their own. With the Allies under severe threat by the onslaught, the British Commander General Douglas Haig issued a famous order of 11th April: "There is no other course open to us but to fight it out. Every position must be held to the last man; there must be no retirement. With our backs to the wall and believing in the justice of our course each one of us must fight on to the end." On 24th April the very first tank versus tank battle took place when three British tanks faced three German tanks. The British were victors in this historic engagement. The defence against the German offensive, proved resolute and German commanders called off their offensive on 29th April. This was in part due to the bravery of American troops who fought alongside the British in the Battle of Lys. The American Expeditionary Force began to make a difference.

During the fighting, 58613 Driver WJ Penaligon of the Royal Field Artillery with the 39th Division Ammunition Column died 12th April 1918. He is commemorated at the Pozieres Memorial (Panel 7 to 10), in the Parish Church of St Breocke and Egloshayle, as well as on the War Memorials on Egloshayle Road and Coronation Park, Wadebridge, and in the publication "Wadebridge Casualties of The Great War" compiled by Ann Trebilcock. William John Penaligon is mentioned in the St Kew Parish Magazine as being listed at the Thanksgiving Service at St James Church in 1918. His father was William Penaligon, born at Egloshayle in 1865 and was a Quarryman; his mother Barbara was born at St Kew in 1864; they had 5 children: William, Edith, Nicholas, Charles and Alex. were living at Trevilling Farm, Wadebridge, at the time of William's death.

William John Penaligon married Hilda Amy Long in 1916 and they had a daughter Dorothy; they were living at Pendoggett at the time of his death. Hilda was a sister to Private Douglas S Long (who died 7th March 1917) and is buried in St James Churchyard.

away from the sinners shuffling on their calloused knees


carrying the dead weight of the world on their shoulders -

Easter Day this year falls on April 1st, April Fools' Day. Our God is a God of surprises so this is an opportunity to exploit not an embarrassment to hide! If you get caught out by someone's trick at Easter, don't repine but seize the moment to reflect upon the surprise. Jesus Christ is not always, if ever, what we expect. Even if we think we know what to expect – and Church people are particularly prone to thinking this – he has a habit of catching us unawares, choosing to come at unexpected moments, in the guise of unexpected people. God's endless generosity is indeed challenged by human greed and want of regard for this, his earth, but it is not stifled by our incompetence or unwillingness to engage with him.

This Easter God offers again his love and blessing to all who have the will to accept what he comes to give.

The world's environment, the increase in alternative diets and national food security are all directly associated with farming. Most reports seem to me unbalanced, leaving non-agriculturists with only half the story; which is where Farmer Jules comes back into play.

Don't yawn, 'dull' isn't my middle name quite yet... I recently attended Cornwall Food and Farming Group's Climate Change Conference. Cornwall Council is aspiring for the county to be carbon neutral by 2030, the National Farmers Union is aiming for agriculture to be net zero by 2040; while the government has set a target for the UK to become net zero by 2050.

Highlight speaker of the day for me was Becky Willson from Duchy College (of Ag). I've come across her a few times over the last 10 years, and she's as enthusiastic about her work as I am about Devon cattle! She was the driving force behind development of the farm Crap App (making the most of livestock dung as fertiliser whilst eliminating wastage into the environment, therefore reducing dependence on artificial fertiliser). It seems Becky's other big project - the Farm Carbon Cutting Tool - has been evolving well and is the only farm carbon calculator that takes sequestration* into account. This is needed to give a true reflection of a farm's position, and as far as I'm concerned: a figure without this is top heavy and rather meaningless.



*Sequestration is the absorption of carbon from the air by pasture, hedgerows and woodland. The opposite of realising carbon from the ground when cultivations such as ploughing is carried out; hence 'min-till' (minimum tillage) has become fashionable in the last decade - reducing emissions by direct drilling crops. This takes new skills to be successful though, crop establishment in an over-seeding situation can be tricky.

Measuring a farm's carbon footprint has a range of benefits: from identifying obvious inefficiencies, which then gives clarity to prioritising improvements (it probably needs to be an annual exercise for comparison); to providing buyers with a product carbon figure to be able to sell commodities (milk processing companies are now building this requirement into contracts), and having factual evidence to demonstrate British agriculture is actually the guardian of vast swathes of the environment.

Next month Farmer Jules is reckoning to participate in some myth-busting!

The Church Electoral Roll is the church's register of electors, which is the list of those qualified to attend and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) where elections take place for the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and the parish's representatives on the deanery synod. The system is intended to enable parishioners at every level to be in touch with the church as a whole and to play their part in decision-making.

Briefly, to be eligible to be placed on the roll, the applicant should be: baptised, at least 16 years old, a member of the Church of England (CE), or of a church in communion with the CE therewith resi-

dence in the parish, or not being resident in the parish to have habitually attended public worship in the parish during a period during a period of 6 months prior to enrolment.

Those parishioners who are on the current list will be accepted for the 2020 list unless they have not habitually attended worship as described above. If there is anyone in the Parish who wishes to be placed on the Church Electoral Roll for the first time should contact William Garland for a registration form. It would be appreciated if all completed forms be returned, or left in the church, as soon as possible - certainly before the date of the APCM, which is on Thursday 27th April at 7.30 pm in the Parish Hall.


In the fullness of time, No standing still, Bursting forth and waving At all this March-light saving And the turn of April Not yet here.

... Uganda!

We are very fortunate to be a part of the British Council's Connecting Classrooms programme. This meant that we have re-established our partnership with Yona Okoth School and are focusing on the sustainable development goals. On 9th February and over half term, seven teachers from schools



within Kernow visited Learning Uganda to strengthen links with our schools. During the trip, they visited seven schools in Uganda were and comed with open arms. Miss Taylor met with Federes, at Yona Okoth, who will be joining us at St Kew in June, for a short visit. She

was able to experience the curriculum followed and the challenges they face in teaching in Uganda. Some classes had as many as 200 children! The teachers are creative in their teaching and use outside space where possible, just like we do at St Kew! The children in Uganda are resilient learners who love to be at school despite the fact that many

walk over an hour to get to school, and due to the food shortages significant а amount do not eat at all until their evening meal. The barriers to learning were very clear, it is extremely difficult to learn when a child's basic needs are not being met. Nevertheless, they were full of smiles and curious to meet the teachers. The children enjoyed writing replies



to the postcards that our children at St Kew had

written and our classes are delighted with the replies. The teachers and students work hard in growing crops to feed the children and often these crops are damaged or eaten by animals because they lack protection, so they are working on raising funds to build a fence to surround these areas. This project will help support the sustainable development goal 2: Zero Hunger. Miss Taylor has been busy sharing her stories and photos with the children and teachers over the last few weeks.

Sport Ability

Sheldon, Kayden, Kyeson and Aaron represented the school fantastically well at last month's Sport Ability' event at the Wadebridge leisure centre. They took part in many different activities including trampolining, boccia and 'curling'. 


CHILDREN'S CORNER

How about decorating some Easter Eggs in fun ways?



Here are a couple of ways to make your Easter "eggstra" special. I hope it will inspire you to do lots of fun things! White eggs work better but brown are fine too, the colours just might be a bit different.

First, hard boil the eggs for 10 minutes, then let them cool in a bowl of cold water.



Natural dyes

- Red cabbage = blue
- Turmeric (2 tbsp) = yellow
- Red onion skins = lavender
- Beetroot = red

Choose the colour you want and place one cupful (or 2 tbsp for the turmeric) in a pan with 2 cups of water and 1 tsp of vinegar. Bring to the boil and boil for 20 minutes then let cool completely.

Food colouring dye

- 1 tsp vinegar
- 1 cup of warm water
- 10-20 drops of food colouring

Be very careful with the dyes as they STAIN – lay down some newspaper and clean up as you go along! Once your dyes are ready you can then dip them into the different colours, then leave them to dry on kitchen paper. Some more ideas:

- Wrap some tape around the eggs and dip them into the dye and when they are dry take off the tape and you will have a stencil effect.
- Put little dot stickers all over you egg, and after you've dyed the egg and it is dry take off the stickers and you'll have a polka dot effect.
- Write something on the egg with a white crayon and see what happens when you dye it!

The possibilities are endless!

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Cynthia Cooks

Cake baking this month for a change. Try this delicious tea cake, or bara brith if you are Welsh. The preparation takes minutes, and it is so simple to make you could let the children loose on it - under supervision of course.

Ingredients

- 350g of dried mixed fruit. I tend to avoid the bags of ready-mixed fruit with those very hard pieces of dried peel, but other than that any mix will do.
- o 225g soft brown sugar
- 250ml (about a mugful) of hot black tea, the stronger the better.
- o 280g self-raising flour
- 1tsp mixed spice
- 1 large egg, beaten

Put the fruit, sugar and tea into a large bowl, stir well, cover with a clean tea towel and leave to stand at room temperature overnight.

The next day pre-heat the oven to 150°c, gas 2. Grease a 1lb/500g loaf tin and line with baking paper.

Stir the flour, beaten egg and spice into the fruit mixture until well combined. Pour the mix into the tin, smooth & level with the back of a spoon and bake for around 1½ hours until risen and a skewer pushed into the middle comes out clean. If the top starts to looks like it is scorching just cover with a piece of foil for the last 20 minutes or so

Leave to cool a little in the tin, and then turn out on a wire rack to cool completely.

Serve in thickly-buttered slices, with a big mug of tea - what else?

Cynthia's tip: as well as the usual sultanas, currants & raisins why not add some chopped ready to eat dried apricots and dates to the mix. As long as the total weight is roughly 350g, any mix of fruit makes a delicious loaf.


What is the best way to slow the spread of coronavirus?

Reflections

Forget snowdrops – for me, the first sign of spring has always been the first glimpse of blossom on the plum tree in my parents' garden. It starts with a coy blush before rippling out into clouds of flamboyant pink blossom, garishly declaring that Spring has Sprung. It took its sweet time this year though, perhaps intimidated by the random spurts of hail and persistent deluge. This winter has felt hard: miserable and damp and now, for many of us, marked by the dogged tread of coronovirus.

Easter celebrations will be unexpectedly quiet this year. Family reunions and get togethers are harder. It seems strange to be celebrating a season which is all about new life in a time when our country is reeling from sickness. But Easter, like spring, is not just about new life. It is also about the struggle which precedes it. Every plant begins its life in dark, damp soil. The blaze of autumn gives way to the thin tremor of winter; petals fall, leaves shiver off branches, and down in the cold, damp earth, seeds lie dormant. Similarly, at Easter, we remember Jesus' darkest moments: betrayed by his friends, aban-

doned by his followers, tortured and killed by his enemies. He too lay underground.

But that is not the end of the story. Darkness gives way to dawn. Winter gives way to spring. And seeds – small, helpless, buried seeds – break through the earth to burst into radiant new life.

This season has seen unexpected struggles. But know that darkness never has the last word. Jesus died so that he could turn death inside out, tear open the walls of the grave and let the blazing sunlight in. When Jesus rose from the dead, he made a way for all of us to follow. He has promised us not just life, but life in abundance: rich, joyful, irrepressible life. Life that bursts out into blossom, undefeated by winter. You may be feeling, like that plum tree, battered and beaten by unexpected storms. But take heart: Easter is coming.

Parish Council: Trees and Hedges

As part of a nationwide campaign, Cornwall is aiming to plant a million trees, of which 55,000 are already in the ground. Your Parish Council is asking residents where possible as householders or landowners to play our part by planting trees and restoring hedges. Whether it is in your garden, on land you own, or in public spaces, we invite you to tell us your ideas, offer your support and join a communal effort for the good of all residents, including our birds, bees, fauna and flora.

We all see the brown rivers of good soil washing out of fields in a winter of deluges, turning to sludge, reducing verges to muddy slicks and half submerging lanes and roads. More trees capture more carbon, bind slopes and banks, soak up water sixty times more effectively than a grass field and in the right places reduce the run-off onto highways. I am sure you can tell us several places where a row of willows and hazels would do the job and disguise lines of posts and wire.

There is also a no-cost way of increasing our trees with no effort at all, except the will and good sense of landholders. Anyone travelling through the parish will see hedges containing mature oaks, hazels, willows, elders and blackthorn. A hedge trimmed on the roadside and the field side left uncut. That is a hedge rich in wildflowers, insects, pollinators, epiphytes, birds of prey, teeming with life. Cattle, sheep and horses instinctively graze the hedge for medicines, nutrition and variety. The landowner keeps yew, knotweed and ragwort under control and there is summer shade and winter refuges.

Yet, we lose rich diversity and break food chains when a flailed and topped hedge marks a field boundary and the silence tells its tale: barely a thrush, a vole, a mouse to take up family life. Yet I have counted thirty species on a pollarded willow in a messy hedge.

Please let us know your thoughts. If you are able to plant a few trees or many, or will manage hedges more sympathetically, St Kew will benefit for the future of all our residents and you will have the huge pleasure of seeing a well-managed landscape and a

lovelier garden or public space. There is help with all this from us, from Cornwall Council, from bodies such as English Nature. We may look forward to new habitats and the return of old favourites to our parish. I'm happy to come and see then let the Parish Council know what you are thinking.





Spring: The time of new beginnings. 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
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
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Dear Editors

We would be pleased if you might consider publishing the following article together with the attached photograph of Stephen Cotton, and first newspaper report in the excellent Pieces of Eight magazine.

Thank you for your consideration: I know its publication would mean a good deal to my Gran and Uncle Rov.

Further to William Garland's excellent work researching the historical background of those brave women and men who made the ultimate sacrifice and are honoured on the St Kew Church war memorial, it may also interest readers to learn a little about other local people who served, suffered and survived the bloody conflicts of the two world wars and then returned to civilian life in the parish.

One of those men was Stephen Cotton. Born a Boscastle lad in 1895, Stephen enthusiastically enlisted into the army in December 1914. After receiving training at Whiteley Common and Aldershot, he was drafted to the front in February 1915 and fought in a number of successful engagements before being wounded by the bursting case of a high explosive shell whilst in a bayonet charge at the Battle of Hooge (which coincidentally was the first engagement where the German army used lammenwerfer, or flamethrowers) in July 1915. As a result, sadly, Stephen lost the majority of his right arm.

Attached is an extract from the Boscastle parish magazine in 1915 which reports his action together with a later photo of Stephen.

After military convalescence, Stephen was discharged from the army and returned to Cornwall. With a positive approach to life he did not allow his physical handicap to perturb his hard-working character and considerate temperament. In 1916 he married - for love - Mary Louisa Branch (better known to the more long-standing residents of Highway village as "Granny Cotton") and the family moved for work between various farmsteads in St Tudy and St Kew parishes before finally settling in St Kew Highway in 1936. The couple raised ten children and Stephen is fondly remembered as a gentle, loving and caring father who always provided for his large family. Sadly, of those siblings, only Roy Cotton and Bet (Brown) are still with us, with Fred Cotton and Marjorie (Stone) passing in recent years.

Due to illness in later life, Stephen eventually settled in Sycamore Cottage, Highway, until his passing in 1949 aged 53 years. Granny Cotton died in 1976, still living in their home.

Thanks to Roy Cotton for keeping the 1915 parish magazine article safe for these many years.

'A sickening crunch' says Crackington owner

A lobster fisherman, Mr. Norman Pjekard of Crackington Haven, is still wondering what cruel stroke of fate singled out his little fishing craft, the "Why Not," for an untimely plunge to the seabed two miles off Strangles Beach, between Crackington and Boscastle, on Thursday week,

Trouble struck suddenly when Mr. Pickard was lifting his lobster pots in the Crackington Haven area. There was a sickening crunch as some semi-submerged object ripped into his 20 feet diesel-powered craft. This thousands-to-one chance stove in the bottom of his loat and broke its ribs.

"It was probably a piece of heavy diffwood or an old tree trunk," Mr. Pickard suggested, but I shall never know for certain.

With his boat last taking water, Mr. Pickard baled furiously and waved his yellow oliskin to attract the attention of fellow-fisherman, Mr. Roy Cotton, of St. Tudy, who was aboard his 22 feet twin-engined craft. "Boscastle Lass," about half-a-mile away.

Mr. Cotton, who had already tended his pots and was on the way back to Boscastle, nappend by chance to spot the signal and immediately turned about and piled on all power to reach the "Why Not." He took Mr. Pickard off and together they tried to tow the foundering craft to the beach at Strangles, the nearest accessible landpoint. But their efforts were in vain. The "Why Not" took water too fast and, with its heavy dieselengine and ballast, went to the bottom like a stone before it had been towed more than 100 yards.

The two men then returned to Boscastle in Mr. Cotton's boat, leaving the "Why Not" settling under ten fathoms of water—to become yet another hulk littering the bottom of the ocean around this threacherous coastline.

Mr. Pickard said atterwards that there had been a fair sea running at the time, but it was nowhere near being rough. He said he had recently given away his only lifejacket to an old man at Boscastle wan had often been asking him for cne.

EXTENSION OF SCHEME

Allen Valley Singers

The Allen Valley Singers – a short history of its life, beginnings, and end.

On a cold February evening in 1994, a small group of ladies met in St. Tudy School, with the hopes of forming a choir. In the event, the birth of the Allen Valley Singers took place that night, with the name reflecting the Allen River and the Valley that housed many villages, including St. Tudy. Rudy Gagnon had previous choir experience having sung with the Loveny Male Voice Choir and he became the Musical Director of this newly fledged choir with Leo Tarring, then only 17, as accompanist. Leo was destined for a musical career and, after a year or two, he and Rudy passed the reins over to Janette Man as MD and Steve Tyrrell as pianist in 1998, both of whom were known as multi-talented and could offer a high level of skill and accomplishment.

The choir was principally a concert choir but nevertheless did enter festivals and competitions, winning many cups and, in so doing, became well known for excellent and lively performances delighting their many and varied audiences.

Over the next few years, the choir attracted members from a wider area than was first envisaged, in fact from Tintagel to Padstow and all points in between. For a short period of time, the choir met at St. James Smith's School in Camelford but finally,

the choir moved to the Community Hall in St. Kew Highway and that became 'home' for the rest of its life

Over time, the Singers have supported many charities, local and abroad, including basic educational supplies to Special Schools in Bulgaria and a Women's Sanitary Unit in a remote African village.

We have had visits to Brittany and Wales, and exchanged visits with other choirs including a very successful joint concert in Bristol. Our Bristolian friends also spent a weekend here in Cornwall and another joint concert was held with great delight for both choirs and for the audience. We have sung at weddings, christenings and, sadly, funerals, all of which have enhanced the services.

For 21 years, Janette and Steve have provided the Allen Valley Singers with an enjoyable leisure activity for us participants and for audiences. We have also been given a musical education and an understanding of singing techniques.

There is a time to begin and a time to end and move on, for the good of all.

Thank you to all the members for their friendship and loyalty, thank you to all the audiences over the years, thank you Jan and Steve.

All good wishes for the future and the 'pastures new.'

Our Feathered Friends

We all welcome the sleek, smart, fork-tailed, blue -backed, red-throated, chestnut and buff-bellied visitor to our shores in early Spring. The Swallow - the bringer of better weather and warm sunny days (we wish!) has arrived from its African journey. The Barn Swallow (to give it its current full title so as not to cause confusion with other Swallow species) spends the late spring and summer in the UK & Europe, including our parish. The first sign of Spring is spotting the first Swallow of the year.

Adult male Swallows make their way on migration to their home breeding grounds in Europe from as far away as the Cape of Good Hope, an astonishing round trip for this slim-line bird weighing approximately 20 grams.

The habitat of the Swallow brings it into close contact with mankind often seen over water or farmland, flying low, hawking for insects with its agile graceful swooping flight, often changing direction on its long wings. Some adult males have longer tail streamers than others which helps attract a mate. They raise two broods from May to September making full use of the thousands of insects caught on the wing. Some pairs can even raise a third in a good year that is warm and sunny and with plenty of food.

The nest made is made from mud with an open top that can be built on ledges in farm buildings, porches and sheds with access through open doors or windows. They often fly low over obstacles (including our heads!) blocking their flight path to their nest. I was lucky to spot my first Swallow at Walmsley

reserve near Chapel Amble on the 12th of March this year - the earliest sighting I have witnessed. Scientists are saying that are migrating birds are arriving earlier and earlier, Global Warming? My last sighting in Autumn currently stands at 6th November, in Wadebridge in 2015. Can anybody claim better?

Swallows tend to get a bit restless come September. Young birds (distinguished by their compact size, shorter tail and duller plumage), gather on wires with the adults, with loud twittering contact noises reinforcing the migratory instinct to get ready to make the long journey south for the winter as their food supply here begins to dwindle.

At this time they often mix with other members of the Hirundinidae family such as House Martins and Sand Martins. Then their journey begins as they make the return voyage flying over the Mediterranean, across the Sahara desert and beyond to the tip of Africa, leaving us all with fond memories of the summer just spent.

We are lucky in the parish to share the story of this special bird through the pages of a children's book 'Jake Swallow', first published in September 2011 by John Solomon, a Middlesex-based author with a soft spot for Cornwall. Published by Book Guild publishing it is the tale of a young Swallow growing up in our parish, dodging the farm cat and starring in the Swallow Olympics around our, and neighbouring parishes.



generously and in return Father gave a regular allowance to the children, and quite often supported their projects with large amounts of cash. Was Mother able to subsidise this after the divorce? There was another problem for the children of both sides who had always enjoyed freedom of movement in the two gardens, exchanging produce from the gardens, and in DIY, making parts for each others occupations. What about the family cat, not to mention the dogs and the chickens?

The two sides have now reached a deadlock, with many of Mother's colleagues not going along with her although they all agreed to initially. When the children asked for the divorce, it was not a mandate but an indication of how the family felt. The whole proceedings have got out of hand. Where do we go from here? Do we ask the children again? Or do we leave it to civil servants (unelected)? Or lawyers (very expensive)? Or perhaps to so called experts who nearly always do not know what they are talking about?

None of this piece has any factual foundation but makes for interesting thought....

The View from the Allotments and my goodness, what a transformation!

It just goes to show – a few day's fine weather, with little wind and no rain and we can get so much done. Tony has managed to rotavate nearly all the two plots, except for the little bits where we're still picking/lifting purple sprouting, leeks and parsnips.

One of the strips I then raked over and put in 80 red onions and 80 white – back-breaking work, as you can't do it from a kneeling position and bending over is the only method! However, when I tell you that I have today taken down the last net of onions which were hanging in the garage and we shall be eating our own produce still for another month, you can see that it's worth the effort! Amazing – only a couple had begun to sprout and even these are usable. I always try to get the onions in by the end of March and I did it this year with a day to spare.

We decided that our strawberry "patch" was sadly overgrown and in any case needed new plants, so Tony has made us a smaller, neater patch with a proper border and put manure, compost and chicken pellets in it and we have bought a dozen brand new and healthy looking plants to occupy it. They are looking very happy and are in a bed of straw which should help later to keep the fruit off the earth and we hope, too, deter the slugs.

In the meantime, Tony has been planting broad beans and peas in various trays in the greenhouse,

so that by the end of April, when the weather is warmer (we hope) we should be able to plant them out. The broad beans which we planted as a sort of experiment at the end of last year haven't exactly failed but they aren't a huge success. We staked them, of course, but they were much battered by the gales and out of a dozen plants, only six or seven really look likely to bear fruit, so to speak. Plenty of flowers on them, so you never know, but I'm not too hopeful.

Tony has also been working on the solar-powered watering system, which he set up a couple of years ago in the greenhouse. He's had to replace some of the wiring, which looks as though a little mouse has been nibbling at it but was probably weakened by last year's high temperatures – it reached over 100 on several days in the greenhouse!

The asparagus is rewarding me for carefully weeding and loosening the soil along the strips. Half a dozen shoots have appeared and I'm hoping we shall have enough in a couple of weeks to have with some fish and new potatoes (sadly the potatoes will be "boughten" not our own, but still)

We have welcomed a couple of new tenants to the site, so that now we are almost full. But do ask if you're interested in joining us, as there is usually a spare plot somewhere.

With spring upon us Cornwall is warming up and it is now time for all to embrace that Cornish sunshine. St Kew, like many North Cornwall villages, regularly receives a lot of tourism in the spring with many people coming to visit the world-famous locations and popular Cornish beaches. It is, however, important for many to know the risks of walking on the cliffs in North Cornwall; especially with dogs that are off the lead. Many rescues have occurred in previous months regarding our poor canine friends tragically falling off cliffs, many due to not being on leads. Only in February did poor Issey, a springerdoodle, fall eighty feet off a cliff in Trevone Round Hole; luckily the dog survived with superficial injuries. I urge all to ensure that when walking their dogs around the beautiful coastal areas that they take necessary precautions to guarantee the safety of both pets and owners alike.

I have also been busy working on some of the initiatives which I hope to bring to North Cornwall. Recently, and after taking part in the parliamentary debate on autism, I had a meeting with the National Autistic Society Cornwall. They have kindly offered to give my staff and I a training session in autism awareness, and I'm hoping we can make Bodmin Cornwall's first autistic-friendly town. Businesses and shops which sign up would turn down music and dim lights to support autistic customers for a period each week.

The coast is close to my heart and I am very keen to see my Bathing Waters Bill included in the wider Environment Bill, which will set the benchmark for our environmental and water quality standards after Brexit. With that in mind I jumped at the chance to take part in a community beach clean at Sandymouth Beach in Bude. The event was hosted by the Pennon Group as part of the 'Great British Spring Clean' campaign organised by Keep Britain Tidy in partnership with the Daily Mail. Other clean up events took place across North Cornwall and I very much enjoyed seeing the pictures posted online.

Finally, I am proud to be one of 41 MP's who have written to Ofcom, on behalf of the all-Party Parliamentary Group on Rural business, to highlight the need for annual monitoring of mobile operators' commitments on increasing rural 4G mobile coverage. Ofcom have recently made moves to maximise 4G coverage across the country including here in North Cornwall. Having more access to 4G across North Cornwall is firmly in everyone's interest with greater coverage allowing for better communication access for both constituents and local businesses alike. I know how important this is for many of my constituents and we continue to fight for better coverage.



You are all stars – THANK YOU SO MUCH.



GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chocolate Crunchies

This no-bake treat is great for lunch boxes and easy for children to make themselves.

Takes 50 minutes, and makes 8-10 crunchies.

Ingredients

- o 200g/8ozs digestive biscuits
- 100g/4ozs butter, plus extra for greasing
- 3 tbsp golden syrup
- 2 tbsp cocoa powder
- 50g/2 ozs raisins

- 100g/4ozs dark chocolate
- Method
 - Butter a 18cm/7in sandwich tin.
 - Seal the biscuits in a strong polythene bag and bash into uneven crumbs with a rolling pin.
 - o Melt the butter and syrup in a pan, or microwave on high for about 1-2 minutes.

- Stir in the cocoa powder and raisins, then thoroughly stir in the biscuit crumbs.
- Spoon into the tin and press down firmly.
- Melt the chocolate in a heat-proof bowl over a pan of simmering water (or microwave on medium for 2-3 minutes).
- o Spread over the biscuit base and chill for about 1 hour.
- o Once chilled cut into 8 10 pieces.

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LEST WE FORGET

May 1919

On 6 May 1919 the Paris Peace Conference disposed of the German colonies. German East Africa was assigned to Britain, and German West Africa to South Africa (part of the British Empire). On 30 May parts of German East Africa: Ruanda (now Rwanda) and Urundi (now Burundi) were ceded to Belgium; and a small part (now Mozambique) to Portugal; Britain retained Tanganyika (now Tanzania). In German West Africa, Namibia became independent in 1990.

On 8 May, Edward George Honey, an Australian journalist, proposed 5 minutes of silence to commemorate the Armistice. This was suggested 6 months before the first observance of the 2 minutes silence that was agreed at the first Remembrance Day on 11 November 1919.

On 27 May, Fyodor Fyodorovich Raskolnikov, real surname Ilyin, a Bolshevik participant in the October Revolution, a journalist with Pravda and arrested several times in Russia, was exchanged for 14 British prisoners-of-war. Ilyin was commanding a Russian fleet when captured by the Royal Navy off Estonia in 1918 and then held in Brixton Prison. He died in 1939 at Nice, France, "having fallen out of a window."

Cornwall at War's End

Every citizen in the country was asked to do their part to help by working, and economising in the use of petrol, light, coal, food and postal services.

In Cornwall, in the weeks after the Armistice, the Royal Navy (RN) withdrew from the Isles of Scilly and elsewhere in the county. The men of the RN Volunteer Reserve and RN Reserve went back to their peace-time activities. Meanwhile, from around the world thousands of Cornish mariners serving overseas finally came home. One merchant sailor from the Lizard's Church Cove had spent the entire war in the Black Sea area, where he had fished to

help provide food for the Forces. When he eventually returned to Cornwall he found many of his village friends had died.

The RN Reserve Trawler Section had some 700 vessels and a force of 39,000 scattered in the home area and abroad. Many of the Cornish craft still in reasonable condition were stripped of their naval equipment and returned to fishing. For another year or so some converted minesweepers continued sweeping for left-over mines.

In Cornwall's mining industry, which during the war had undergone a mini-revival, collapsed. Fishing also faltered, but recovered later.

Truro's Auxiliary Naval Hospital had grown to 210 beds and during its short lifetime treated over 4,000 patients. In March 1919 the Red Cross handed back the buildings to the Work House Board of Guardians and the site reverted to its former role.

Heligan House became an officers' convalescent home until the Tremayne family returned in peacetime. At Cotehele House near Saltash, Lord Mount Edgcumbe allowed servicemen back from the fighting to use portions of his land for market gardening.

As the military left Cornwall, so too did refugees from overseas who had sought sanctuary from their invaded countries. Ladock parish church has an illuminated inscription acknowledging a family's gratitude for the kindness of local people.

The parish of Herodsfoot in the West Looe valley near Liskeard has a memorial which records the names of all the thirteen men from the community who went to war and returned home safely. There is only a handful of British communities that didn't lose a soul – they are known as 'Thankful Villages'; Herodsfoot is Cornwall's only Thankful Village, one of about 50 across the country.



During the last financial year we have fed equivalent to 3,114 people and provided over 87,000 meals during this time. We have distributed over 28 tonnes of food, that's around 560 shopping trolleys. With your support we're able to help people in crisis, like the lady who had an accident at home and is struggling to pay her mortgage whilst she is off work.

The HOME GROUP (previously known as Stonham Housing) will be holding a Drop-In Session at Bodmin Foodbank on Mondays starting on 13th May. They will offer help and support with health, housing and social care.

CITIZENS ADVICE - HELP TO CLAIM is a dedicated service from *Citizens Advice*. It's free, independent, confidential and impartial. Their trained advisers can help with things like how to gather evidence for your Universal Credit application or how to prepare for your first Job Centre appointment. 

ST. KEW WAR MEMORIAL

By 1919 the First World War, the war to end all wars, the Great War, had ended.



The people were proud, along with their allies, of their achievements yet there was a growing realisation of the debt they owed to the men and women who had served their country but particularly to those who had lost their lives.

It was in this climate that in March 1919 the Reverend Dalton-Jackson suggested to the Parish Council that a memorial should be raised to their memory.

A memorial committee was formed chaired by Admiral Cayley CB and with Councillor J.H. Hawken its secretary. Their brief was to decide what form the memorial should take and to raise the funds necessary, as it had been agreed by the Parish Council that the cost should not be bome by the ratepayer but by public

subscription. By the end of 1920 the memorial of fine De Lank granite had been erected and the approximate £200 required, an enormous sum for the time, largely raised.

At 3pm on 3rd March 1921 a service was held in the church and later at the memorial, which was still draped in the Union Flag, Mr Jacob Stone parish warden presented Mr Nicholas Bray, Chairman of the Parish Council with a Deed of Conveyance which entrusted the memorial to the Parish Council's care for all time. The St Kew Soldiers Hymn was sung and Admiral Cayley unveiled the memorial. The Bishop of Truro then conducted the dedication service and consecrated the ground upon which it stood.

Despite the optimism, within less than thirty years the Parish Council were once again discussing what form a memorial should take. This time to honour those who had lost their lives in the Second World War. (continued page 2)

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
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
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Port Isaac GP Practice

Adjustments to the service provided and the appointment system

In response to a request from the Parish Council (see 'Parish Council News' towards the back of this edition), the practice has provided Pieces of Eight with this statement outlining the changes to the way their service will be provided in the future.

Introduction

General practice across the country is facing unprecedented challenges in workforce recruitment with increasing complexity and demand for primary care. Changes in workforce at a national and local level have an impact on the way primary care is run. Following recent changes in clinical staffing at Port Isaac Surgery, we have undertaken a review of how we can continue to deliver services to our patients in a safe, sustainable way.

The practice will be moving to a new model of providing care, adopting systems widely used across the country. The aim is to ensure that we are able to provide efficient care tailored to our patient's different needs. For example, urgent and acute illnesses compared to routine, long-term care and follow up.

Main Points

- Care will be provided using a range of clinicians including:
 - o Doctor
 - o Nurses
 - o Pharmacists
 - o Specialist paramedics.
- Reception Team:
 - o Have been trained in ensuring that patients see the right person at the right time.
 - o Rely on information provided by patients to facilitate this.
 - o Where this information is not available, we will be unable to ascertain what appointment type is required and will offer the next available routine appointment.

- Routine Appointments:
 - o Will still be available to be booked in advance (up to two weeks).
 - Will be either face to face or by telephone, at a time and location that is convenient.
 - Patients with very specific requirements may find they need to wait longer before a suitable appointment becomes available.
- Urgent care requiring on the day assessment:
 - o Will be under the care of an acute clinician.
 - o May be dealt with over the phone, or at one of our surgeries.
 - o We may not be able to offer a choice of clinician or surgery site.
- Appointment Booking:
 - To ensure fair and equitable access to booking appointments, we will no longer be able to take bookings at the reception desk.
 - All appointments will need to be booked over the phone or online, and we will be improving access and accessibility to booking appointments in this way.

The improvements to our service that are outlined above are aimed at ensuring a safe and sustainable future for Port Isaac Surgery and our patients. We strive to provide a modern, efficient primary care service.

We would appreciate the support and help of our patients in this process.

been 'Digging for Vic- (tory' a project linked to their World War 2 class topic.






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

Our Feathered Friends

'Chow, chow' rhymes with 'plough', a welcome sound for those in the know! A visit down West Cornwall to selected sites, and this sound is your first encounter with a Cornish Chough. Always pleased (ok, rather chuffed!), to see this magnificent bird. Pronounced 'Chuff' not 'chow' as its call. The Chough is a member of the crow family similar to a Jackdaw in size and could once be found on much of the coastline.

It has declined from a large number of areas around the UK during the last century. It is a handsome glossy black bird. The splendid red curved bill stands out well on the adults, and it also has nicely co-ordinated red legs to match. In flight, the square-tipped deeply-fingered wings help it glide and turn effortlessly on the thermals. Choughs can also dive with their wing's half closed before pulling up in a steep climb around the cliff areas.

The Chough is now confined to Atlantic coasts of Brittany, Scotland, Wales, Ireland and of course now in Cornwall again. Their diet consists of insects, beetles, flies and grubs. They prefer short turf areas on the cliff tops, cattle often help as they keep the grass trimmed as well as attracting lots of insects for hungry mouths. They gather in small flocks throughout the year. Nest sites can be an old mine shaft, cave or holes in the cliff edges of rugged coast line. Nests are expertly monitored and guarded by the RSPB, and here by the Cornwall Chough project, plus a string of dedicated volunteers. Choughs are closely monitored and all are ringed at birth to help identify individuals and track and protect their habi-

tat. The Chough sadly disappeared as a breeding bird in Cornwall back in 1971, until nature had its say again in 2001. Plans were afoot to reintroduce this iconic bird to Cornwall, however some wild birds arrived from either Ireland, Wales or Brittany, and liked what they found on the Lizard coastline. Three Choughs arrived, perhaps seeking new territory and the pair successfully reared three young, much to the joy of many. 'Palores' was back again in the county, and it has continued with steady success, with other areas of the west also having some breeding birds.


We all have seen the Chough image as it proudly sits on top of the Cornish coat-of-arms, with a fisherman and a tin-miner for company. The first Chough family I came across was many years ago, in Pembrokeshire, however I have since seen many in the West and on the Lizard. The nearest sightings to our parish have been small numbers exploring at Trevose Head and Park Head, west of Padstow.

Long may they continue to breed successfully, and a big thank you to land-owners and trusts providing the framework to help this bird succeed. Dear 'Palores', (Cornish for Chough), the national bird of Cornwall, a bird steeped in mythical history, with connections to King Arthur - but that's another story.

Chow for now, happy birding.

First of all, I'm glad of the sunshine and blue skies, which are very cheering, but not so pleased with the cold winds, which just won't let us alone.

A friend had given us some tomato plants and then we bought some more at the Plant Sale in the Community Hall, and I am sad to report that we have lost nearly all of them. We had hardened them off outside in the greenhouse and dug over and manured the strips we wanted to plant them in but sadly the night after we got them in, we actually had a FROST! Yes, I know, we should have left them another week to acclimatise themselves but we didn't and we have been punished for it. Since then, I have bought another dozen from Trelawney, planted three in the greenhouse in the back garden and I'm bringing the others on back here at the house. They will go in at the weekend, if all goes well and the weather stays dry and warm.

Do you remember how I boasted about the asparagus? How we had weeded and sprinkled the beds with chicken manure and were awaiting copious bundles of spears throughout May and June? Well, we have had a few (small) bundles and shall continue to harvest a few spears here and there but overall they have FAILED! And of course, they take up a lot of space, as you have to leave the crowns in and can't use the strip for anything else. So probably we shall dig up this patch and give up on the asparagus. It takes such a lot of time and effort

for insufficient reward. Much better to use the patch for brassicas, which see us all through the Winter and on until April. Shame, though – picking your own asparagus always felt like a real treat.

Meanwhile on the plus side, our broad beans are doing really well and promise a good crop. Tony had dug up the old and tired gooseberry bushes beside the greenhouse and dug in lots of good stuff, so they are making good use of this freed-up patch. Also, the peas he sowed have all come up wonderfully well and we have planted out one thick row each of Early Onward (common-or-garden peas), Sugarsnap and Mange-tout. He's also got an ingenious gutter-full of peas in the greenhouse which will be put around our weird "edifice" which was built last year for the runner-beans. He got an old piece of plastic guttering from Bob Plater, filled it with compost and sowed masses of peas in it and they have all germinated and are growing apace. We do love fresh peas and last year they were a great success.

The onions are a bit depressing at the moment – a mass of weeds, despite the fact that I have hoed them diligently. We will have to get down on hands and knees and do the more traditional weeding this weekend, as we do count on the onions to see us through months of cooking.

Leeks are coming along well in the greenhouse, but the sweetcorn has failed and we shall have to plant some more. The greens are fine, so that's all to report this month.

Review for May 9th 2019

"Frightful Shipwreck - Awful Loss of Life". Plymouth and Stonehouse Journal report May 1885:

The wreck of The Barque John sailing with emigrants from Cornwall and Devon to Quebec, Canada, smashed on the Manacles Reef off The Lizard near St Keverne, South West Cornwall. The subject of a very well researched talk by Mrs Nicola Wills, volunteer at Wadebridge and District Museum. A subject of great significance to people in Cornwall whose ancestors comprised many of the lost pas-

sengers, many of whom are buried in a mass grave in St Keverne Churchyard.

Mrs Wills' passion and interest in the stories of the people on that fateful voyage, both survivors and those who died, pays homage to people of all skills and levels in Cornwall and Devon at that time seeking a new life and opportunity in the new world. There are many well documented reports of this tragedy- Google it and be enthralled!



On the previous page, on the front cover of St Kew Parish magazine under 'District Distributors' you will see a Miss Hawken mentioned.

She had very distinctive curly hair as can be seen in several



postcard images of the time. The second image shows her in the middle at the back with the big black hat and stick! Quite a character. She was the sister of Irwin Hawken who was the landlord of the St Kew Inn at the time and she was known in the family as 'Aunt Pop'.

The magazines the History Society have in their archive belonged to her. They were given to the History Society by her great niece, Nan Willis (nee Hawken) in 2009.

St Kew Parish Magazine, 1982

In 1982 after retiring as Head of Business Studies at Queen Elizabeth School/College, Wimborne, John Brander (better known as Jack) moved to Cornwall, settling first in St Tudy, then St Kew.


Jack soon got involved in organisations within the parish - he became secretary of the St Kew Gardening Association, the secretary & clerk of St Kew Parish Council, and was also involved in the local British Legion.

During his involvement in the local activities, and given that he would have access to information that would be useful for parishioners, he developed and published the magazine "Our Parish", which would eventually become to Pieces of Eight.

Jack would type the content of the magazine, which consisted of two pages at that time, and then using his own duplicator would produce around 250 copies, all of which were copied and stapled together during one evening each month at Jack's home. The magazines were then distributed by Jack and by Betty Lethbridge to the local shops, church and pubs.

Jack's good work was recognised by the Parish Council who made a donation towards the cost of producing the magazine. Jack was also able to get a few advertisers onboard (this, as now, would have helped with the cost of production).

Jack included a regular item - 'Thought for Today' and Betty became a regular contributor to the magazine providing recipes each month.



During 1992 Jack moved back to St Tudy, but continued to produce the magazine until Judith and Tony Mott took over.

Jack passed away in 2011, and on behalf of the current magazine committee and everyone in St Kew Parish, thank you Jack for having the foresight and drive to develop the magazine in its modern guise, and thank you Betty for sharing this information and photograph with us.

NEW LOCK FOR "YOUR PARISH"

Many of you will have been aware that, sine The Parish Review, a small working group has been working to extend the distribution of, and to improve the look of the excellent Parish Magazine which has for so long been written and published alone by Jack Brancer. He took on this interesting and enjoyable task.

He has however indicated that it is time for others to take over, and this is what we hope to do. Thank you Jack for all your hard work up to now - we hope that we will be able to live up to the well-deserved reputation which "Your Parish" has achieved, and we also hope that you will take a prime interest in the "New Look Your Parish" (NLYP).

To get the NLYP started, the working group have applied for two one-time grants. These are from the Cornwell Rural Community Council and from the Parish Council, each for £100. We are most grateful for both of these, and the money will be used to put the magazine on computer, which will give enhanced flexibility and appearance, particularly for photographs, drawings and advertisers' logos.

In addition the Parish Church and the Parish Council have said that, subject to viability and success, they will conate £50 each year to assist to cover some of the running expenses.

As a result of this generosity, from October this year it is hoped to produce the NLYP megazine in a new look format based on a different form of production and printing. It will remain very much a Community Magazine with contributions from local societies and businesses, from those interested in the environment and the Methodist Chapel and St James Church.

Your Parish – the first ten years

Judith and Tony Mott take us back to the beginning of the new look 'Your Parish'

Actually it was a shade under ten years, as we took over as Editors during the Winter of 1995 and handed the job on to Sandra Woods and Linda Monk in July 2004. But during those years we took the magazine from a single sheet of A4 to a 20-page issue and it's good to see that it's still alive and kicking!

The first magazine, edited and produced by Jack Brander, took the form of a two-sided sheet of paper which was run off on an old Gestetner machine – remember those? Jack produced 250 copies which were held at the shop at Highway and I think in the various pubs and the church, too. I don't remember any advertising, although there might have been the occasional mention of a local business.

When we took over from Jack, it was an initiative from St. James' Church and R.Adm Alec Weir that was instrumental in getting a committee formed and a "new-look" magazine started.

Our first meeting was held in Alec and Ann's sitting room and consisted of Alec as Chairman, Laura Ford as Treasurer, Tony to take over all the IT and publishing, me to write as much as possible and solicit advertising, and Maida Davy and Peter Coster as additional committee members. The aim was to produce some 500 copies and hand deliver them to just about all the households in the parish, from Trelill to Amble and all places in between. Once we had settled into a pattern, our meetings were always held around Alec's dining-table, fuelled by G & Ts, sherry, or a cup of tea.

I think our first effort consisted of two sheets, 4 sides of A4, and had an editorial on the front page, about 5 or 6 adverts, and some items of local interest. By this stage we had also enlisted an army of distributors, each of whom took over a street or lane or patch as their regular beat.

We soon settled into a regular pattern and developed several very popular features. We always had photo competitions – "where is this lane?", "what is this mystery object?" and so on. And when the magazine came out, Tony and I had to man the phone with a note-pad, as we would get anything up to fifteen or so answers, each person anxious to be first to get it right. And then of course, the next issue would list the names of all those who had been in touch, so it was a sort of rolling attraction.

We did spoof editorials for April 1st (usually written by Peter Coster), an especially beautiful calligraphic front page produced each Christmas by Marcus Cavill, regular news features from the school and a wonderfully informative gardening article by Jenny McGann, still our Parish Tree Warden in St. Kew.

We were strictly apolitical and never featured ads for political meetings or events, preferring to concentrate on essentially "parochial" concerns.

Articles would appear through our letter box from Jenny, from the WI, from the local choir and so on and I would type everything up on the computer, transfer it all over to Tony, who would fit it into a publishing programme and then hand it back to me for proof-reading. Then it was off to Camelford, where it was printed at Sir James Smith's school and boxed up for me to collect later. And then came the great collation – around my dining-table with the help of more of our loyal assistants – Gill Fuller, Alison Wellington, and many others.

We'd collate, then staple, then pile into heaps of ten which were then totted up and put into envelopes for the distributors to collect from the shop.

Meanwhile, the magazine was gaining in popularity and also very sought after by advertisers. I used to go round the parish (and into town for some contributors, like the Regal which supported us from the very start) and collect the money in cash each month. I had this saying "if it's in my left pocket, it's not my money", as we didn't have the sort of advertising base which the magazine now enjoys. But we always had enough money to print the next edition and have a bit left over for ink-cartridges and so on.

In a sense, it is easier to take on something at the start and watch it grow than perhaps to leap in half-way along. We were pleased to be able to hand over to Sandra and Linda in 2004, although I have to admit we did feel a bit proprietorial about the whole thing. It was almost our "baby" and we were anxious for it to live and thrive.

Which of course it has done.

NATURE NOTES - OCTOBER 1995

Folklore tells us that we are in for a hard winter. THE NORTH CORNWALL RAILWAY

I suppose that, of the many ways in which newcomers first discover North Comwall, mine is one of the less common. My debt is owed to the North Comwall railway, which ran from the main line connection at Okehampton through to Padstow, linking up with the line from Bodmin at Wadebridge.

Although a professional railway engineer, I could never resist the combination of beautiful country, steam locomotives and the country railway, and I resolved to explore the North Comwall. The railway left the main London - Plymouth main line at Meldon, a few miles west of Okehampton, where the old London and South Western Railway had quarried stone for its ballast and engineering construction, and where it built one of its most spectacular bridges to cross the ravine of the West Okement river. Ten years later I found myself helping to run the quarry and supply material for the Meldon Dam. From Okehampton, high above the town, the line climbed higher to the summit, and swung west over the A30. It crossed undulating North Devon to Halwill, then a hamlet where a junction was made, two branch lines serving Bude and, later, Torrington. The railway then ran steeply downhill to Launceston, crossing the Tamar just before running into Launceston to a station beneath the castle. Here the site was shared with the old Great Western Railway branch from Plymouth via Tavistock. It was on leaving Launceston that one encountered North Comwall, following in the footsteps of Betjeman, first in the names of Egloskerry and Tresmeer, and secondly the increasing sound of the Atlantic breezes as the train pounded up the steep climb to Otterham. At either Launceston or Otterham, the driver and fireman would change over with Wadebridge men who had worked eastwards, each taking the others' train back to their home station. From here a little more slogging from the loco, and we passed the summit of the line near Trewanion, nearly as high as the line where it passed Yes Tor at Meldon. Then it was helter-skelter all the way down the gradient to Wadebridge, wheels squealing on the sharp curves, down through Camelford, Delabole with its huge quarry and distinctive rail wagons carrying slate dust, round the semicircle through Port Isaac Road, and St.Kew Highway. In order to keep the gradients manageable without costly earthworks the surveyors had to change the alignment in a constant series of curves, prompting the observation at Wadebridge depot that "they must've been paid by the mile".

long-term forecasting knowledge which Michael Fish would kill for! Remember the old saying about beating the walnut tree to produce a fine crop. Beech trees in particular are famous for producing thousands of seedlings when they are suffering, to ensure their survival. Mushrooms are a-plenty in pastures which have been stocked with cattle and sheep and bring many of us out with our carrier In the woodland, all manner of fungi can be found, from fine bracket fungi on ancient birch and beech to the pixie's favourite fly agaric - the red with white dots toadstool found amongst the oak leaves and rotting branches. Britain, we are very conservative about our eating habits, whereas in France and Eastem Europe, villagers basketfuls of these often beautiful and delicious delicacies. Keep your eyes open for the impressive giant puffballs, which sometimes can be found under hedge banks. These when fresh are solid and almost like eating a tender steak, with enough to last a family four or five meals. Stock up the freezers and larders just in case there is more truth in the old folklore than I suggest!

SLOE AND APPLE JELLY

This is a bumper year for bernies - make a change from sloe gin with this rich, slightly tart jelly:

 $2\frac{1}{4}$ lb sloes

3/4 lb cooking apples

water

white sugar

Wash and prick the sloes if they have been picked before the first frost. Chop the apples and simmer with the sloes and just enough water to cover, until the fruit is very soft. Turn into a jelly bag and drain ovemight. Measure the juice and add 1½ lb sugar for each pint. Put in pan & stir until dissolved, then boil until a set is obtained. Pot & seal.

The next 12 years......

I became one of the editors of the St Kew magazine in 2004. Judith and Tony Mott were about to start a new life in Spain and had put out a final appeal to save the magazine. I had recently retired from work as a computer programmer and was looking for something to do within the community. Although we had lived in Trequite since 1973, my knowledge of the local community was minimal being busy with a working life. It was with some unease that I responded to Tony and Judith as I had no knowledge of desktop publishing. I was also anxious not to take it on on my own.

As fate would have it, Linda Monk, living in Pendoggett and a stranger to me, responded at the same time. Thus a new partnership and friendship began and the magazine survived.

When we took over, the magazine was printed at Camelford school in black and white and required physically taking the printed master copy to the school and collecting the boxes of un-collated sheets a few days later. There was an existing committee made up of Alex Weir (chairman), Ceinwen Greenwood (secretary) and Maida Davey (treasurer) who handled all the background jobs. As time went by, the committee retired and we had a new band of helpers with Jenny Cheeseman joining us as a third editor for a time, and a large band of willing helpers to join us at the Community Hall in St Kew Highway where we would set up tables to collate and staple the magazine together. It took a couple of hours and the magazine was then

counted into various bags and delivered to what was then Cost Cutters for collection by the volunteer deliverers. This was a very social afternoon of chat and laughter. Once the job was complete we would sit down for tea and cake and discuss problems that might have occurred and ideas for future issues.

Originally the magazine has been called Your Parish. However, there was some call to rename it as some thought this signified it was a church magazine. The magazine had always been intended as a community magazine where the word 'parish' was to signify that the magazine was relevant to everyone in the parish of St Kew, made up of the eight villages of St Kew Highway, St Kew Churchtown, Trequite, Chapel Amble, Trewethern, Pendoggett, Trelill, and Tregellist.

Appeals for suggestions for a new name culminated in adopting the name 'Pieces of Eight', the 'eight' being the 8 villages in the parish.

Over time, Camelford school updated their equipment such that we firstly were able to email the completed copy to the school and then later their equipment automatically collated and stapled, and finally we moved into colour printing.

Linda and I edited the magazine for 12 years during which time we learned so much about St Kew and made many friends. It certainly proved to be a great way of becoming part of a great community.

Seasons come and go - Farmer Jules

For a couple of years (not so long ago), there was a regular Farmer Jules column in Pieces of Eight. It followed the seasons and associated agricultural activities: turning rams in with the ewes at blackberry time, housing cattle for the winter (equals yard work taking priority on Christmas Day), the joys of spring lambing and calving, and the contraries of weather- dependant summer work - be it shearing or saving hay. The odd social event spiced up the calendar, but such outings were usually farm oriented: from a day at the Royal Cornwall Show or annual Farmers Club dinner to sticky-beaking at other farmers' standing corn on a dog walk.

Hence Farmer Jules used to bang on about food labels: looking for the Red Tractor logo in supermarkets (the guarantee of British standards from farm to fork) and if you pay peanuts you're likely to get monkeys! Remember those burgers there was such an uproar over? If shoppers had more than just glanced at the label, they'd have noticed it never claimed to be 'beef' burgers! In these volatile times of pending international trade deals, it's worth remembering a Union Jack signifies packaged in the UK; British produced chicken isn't chlorinated (as standard American chicken is) due to there being no need (production hygiene standards), and nor does British produced beef contain any growth hormone (as American feed-lot beef often does). Both these import examples are likely to be cheaper on supermarket shelves as they've been produced to different (dare I suggest lower) standards. If you're a carnivore, there is a way to trust provenance while not spending extravagantly - shop with a reputable butcher. Ask his advice - for a particular meal or budget recommendations, look him in the eye and he'll not dare sell you a pup!

As for looking after the planet: take a look around the parish, or the Westcountry (or even the other livestock areas of the UK) - you'll notice vast areas of grassland, hedgerows and woods. These all soak up carbon (known as sequestration) at far greater rates than the conventional UK beef or sheep system is producing it; therefore somewhat balancing other folks' emissions (who has a car or sometimes flies on an aeroplane?) A sound agricultural contribution to the environment I'd say. If you see a food label stating 'pasture-fed', this is what it's about; other benefits include the product will generally have better eating qualities and potentially improved nutritional values.

Why should farmers be thanked for doing a job they love? Yes, it's not a salaried position (like perhaps an accountant), there's no paid holidays/weekends off/maternity or sick leave (as a postman might have); yes it's long hours, dirty work and subject to many things outside of our control (the weather, increasing regulation, poor broadband); but none of this sets farmers apart from other rural small businesses or the self-employed generally.

"Ah – sorry folks - must dash. I see the next-door's cat down the side of our greenhouse. I can't squeeze down there but I can give her an awful fright! Bye!" (Scrambling and scratching of claws as she careers out of the conservatory into the garden.)

'BAGGING'- EARLY 2000s

We were a gang of enthusiasts that gathered in the Community Hall once a month to put the magazine together, 'Your Parish' as it was then. We were there to 'bag the mag'.

Sandra Woods, Linda Monk, Jenny Cheesman – the three co-editors - each working one month in three, Ceinwen Green, Secretary, Tania Healing, Treasurer and Advertising, were the chiefs. Jean Plater, William Garland (when he could get there), Violet Sullivan, David and I were the indians and helped put it all together. The mag was printed by Camelford School in those far off days (where do the years go?) and taken there by by the editor on a disc produced on a desktop publishing programme. It was collated, printed page by page in separate piles.

We laid them out in piles on a couple of those big tables in the Community Hall. Then, having checked that we had each pile of paper in the right order we walked carefully round the table gathering one page at a time from each pile. We did get it wrong once by getting page two and page three mixed up, only discovering this too late. We got a few complaints the following month but as Sandra said "It shows people are reading the thing!" I digress.

Having assembled our pile of pages we squared them neatly in to book form and folded them in half very accurately. Ceinwen was very particular that we got them neat. They were then passed to Linda who sat proudly at the end of the table brandishing the biggest stapling machine I had ever seen. She must have had a strong right arm as she stapled over 600 copies, one staple only, right in the middle of the spine. BANG! The magazines were then bagged into their neat little black bags for distribution, a correct number in each bag for each deliverer.

Job now compete we had our unofficial committee meeting with tea and cake, each taking it in turn to bring cake. Ceinwen gave us a run down of the parish news all written in her magnificent shorthand. Tania gave her report on the mag's finances. We then loaded everything into Sandra's car and she delivered them to the village shop where they were collected by the gang of wonderful distributors. We had gossiped, giggled and had a good afternoon.

ST KEW PARISH MAGAZINE

The Parish Magazine used to be written by the Parish Priest who published marriages, births, churching, baptisms, deaths and funerals. The Parish priest from 10 February 1852 to 4 December 1915 was the Reverend Nicholas Thomas Every (1817-1915), who on his death had been the longest serving vicar in the country – 64 years.

The St Kew Historical Society Archivist, currently Kim Appleby, holds copies of Parish Magazines from 1898 to 1918. These magazines provided an insight into parish life and how the parishioners contributed towards the welfare of troops during World War 1. They also recorded the deaths of parishioners who gave their lives in action. The national shortage of paper meant that in July 1917 until December 1918 the St Kew Magazine amalgamated with the Magazine of the Parish of St Endellion.

On the 2 September 1978 the St Kew Annual Show of flowers, fruit, vegetables, produce, cooking, etc, was held in the Parish Hall on 2 September 1978. This year St Kew will be holding the first of its shows under the revitalised organisation. Entries were to the Secretary J.C. Godden, Lane Park, telephone Port Isaac 217. Entry fee 3p per entry. [Interesting telephone number.]

October 1981. Recent heavy rain and the flooding of Amble marshes prompted Mrs. Lottie Hobbah to recall an unusual task she performed some seventy years ago [1911]. Before the Amble River was straightened and a tide-gate constructed below

Trewornan Bridge, flooding of the marshes was more severe and commonplace. The task of Lottie Hobbah, then in her early teens, was to use her father's pony and trap to transport the Postman through the flood waters. The Post Office paid the princely sum of 1/6d. [15p today?] for each delivery. She recalls

that sometimes the pony baulked when the flood waters touched his underbelly but, with suitable encouragement from those on dry land, the crossing would be safely made. There is no recorded loss of Postman or H.M. Mail!

In 1983, in response to losing their trees to Dutch Elm disease the population of about 200 from Chapel Amble planted 180 trees donated by Cornwall County Council around the village as organised by architect John Buchanan. His wife, Janet, stated "Everyone, except for a few that were sick, turned out. It was really a marvellous response. John organised it because the Dutch Elm disease has made the village look so bare."

In 2010 a monthly article was started called We Will Remember Them, which recorded short biographies of individuals from the two world wars who are remembered on the Parish War Memorial on the anniversary of their death. This series was changed on the 100th anniversary of the first world war in 2014 called Lest We Forget, which provided information about what was happening throughout the war zones and local news extracted from the old Parish Magazines.

2014. The Magazine published extracts from a poetry book "Last Man Standing" by Stuart Medland, which he wrote in memory of his father Lawrence Cecil, who spend much of his childhood in Trelill. The poem covered such local subjects as: the Church of St James, choristers, wrestling, the Ford, and cricket. The poems were a lovely link with the past, a past that Cornwall treasures as an era of not only of work in the fields but also of the romance of the country-side cycle, companionship in hardship, family bonding, and the livelihood, that we see in jigsaw puzzles, and as a straw to be grasped when the effects of modern living become intolerable.

Eventually, with a welcome increase in revenue from advertising, we were able to afford a commercial printer (the ever-helpful Phil at Parish Magazine Printing in Holsworthy). We now simply email him a PDF and a few days later the the courier arrives with the finished magazines, neatly boxed and grouped in batches of 20 which makes bagging (yes will still do that by hand, and have tea and cake!) so much easier.

We now deliver the filled bags to our lovely distributors which gives us the chance to have a chat with them as we really do appreciate them delivering for us. Aunt Avice kindly stores the returned bags for us, which is so helpful.

We've tried not to make too many changes to the format and layout, beyond adopting a 'house style' with a standard font and point sizes for editorial content. Why change a winning formula?


Proposed new road markings for St Kew Highway

After requests from the Parish Council, Cornwall Highways have sent proposed traffic calming road marking for St Kew Highway and Trelill road.

The Council studied these and have sent a request that the "dragons teeth" at the Trelill side, be replaced with rumble strips. It was thought that most of the speeding traffic came from this direction and rumble strips by the garage would be too noisy for a built up area.

They have also requested that a space be marked for a bus to stop by the bus shelter, so buses could stop without blocking the road.

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Orange Crumb Salmon

Salmon fillets are always on special offer somewhere, but still seem luxurious - especially in this delicous summery recipe.

Takes 35 minutes. Serves 4

Ingredients

- 85g/3ozs fresh breadcrumbs (around 2 thick slices of white bread)
- o 2tbsp olive oil, plus extra for greasing
- Finely grated zest and juice of 1 orange
- 4 tbsp chopped parsley
- 4 boneless & skinless salmon fillets, about 140g/5oz each in weight
- o 700g/1lb 9 oz new potatoes
- 3 tbsp mayonnaise
- Salt and pepper to season

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 200c/gas 6. Mix together the breadcrumbs, oil, orange zest and half the parsley. Season.
- Put the salmon fillets on a baking tray lined with greased foil. Press the orange crumbs on to each salmon fillet so they stick. Bake for 15-20 minutes until the salmon is just cooked and the topping is golden.
- Meanwhile cook the potatoes in a pan of salted water for 12-15 minutes until tender then drain. Stir the remaining parsley into the mayonnaise and thin with the remaining orange juice until it has consistency of single cream.

Serve the salmon with new potatoes and garden peas and herb mayonnaise.

From Sproull's Blog - No Fault Evictions

There has been much written in the media recently about the Government's proposals to alter the ability of landlords of residential properties to evict tenants after giving two months' notice. While this makes a good headline, if you delve a little deeper, there are things that tenants can to do protect themselves.

It is usual for residential property to be let on an Assured Shorthold Tenancy. It is this type of tenancy which can be brought to an end with two months' notice. The two months' notice can, however, only expire once the fixed term of the tenancy has expired.

Most tenancy agreements are granted for six months and then the tenants stay on afterwards. This means that notice can be served to end the tenancy at the end of the six month period or at any time thereafter on two months' notice. If you want to stay in a property for longer than six months, then the obvious thing to do is to try to negotiate a longer term at the outset or, when the initial six months is coming up to expire, go to the landlord and arrange for another six months or twelve months, or whatever, to be granted to you. In that way, as long as you pay the rent and observe your obligations, you are safe until the expiry of the next fixed period.

It is the habit of allowing tenancies to roll-on after the initial period has expired that leaves people vulnerable to eviction on two months' notice without being at fault. If two months' notice is served, a landlord cannot evict the tenant without taking Court proceedings – this is a criminal offence. These proceedings take time and, often, if the tenant needs to be re-housed by the local authority, a Court Order will be required to prove that they are in need of housing. It may take some months to obtain an Order.

Although the headlines talked about "no fault" evictions, there are restrictions on landlords using what are known as Section 21 Notices (the two month notice). Landlords cannot engage in what are called "revenge evictions". If, for example, a property is in disrepair and the tenant has let the landlord and the local authority know this (and followed certain procedures) the landlord is not able to serve a Section 21 Notice.

The essential points to take away from this piece are:

Try to make sure that you have as long a fixed term as you need (although appreciate that you cannot bring the fixed period to an end early unless the tenancy allows you to) and;

If you are served with a notice, take some advice. There are plenty of solicitors who are experienced in this area of law or you could talk to Shelter which is a charity employing expert advisors.

Implications of the War

Surrendered German Ships

On 21 June 1919 at 10am a message stating "Paragraph Eleven – Confirm", was sent to all ships of the German High Seas Fleet. It was the pre-arranged code for them to scuttle the fleet. Following their surrender in November 1918, the 74 ships of the German fleet had remained in Scapa Flow – a large area of water in the Orkney Islands – with a small caretaker crew, where they became a tourist attraction.



The German feared their ships would be distributed amongst the Allies after the Versailles peace talks and so to prevent this, the order was given.



Fifty-two ships were sunk by their own crew members; only four ships were saved.

Salvage of the Fleet was carried out but seven ships remain underwater. It remains the biggest single loss of ships in maritime history.

Treaty of Versailles

The Treaty of Versailles was signed in Halls of Mirrors of the former French royal palace on 28 June 1919 thus concluding the war with Germany.

The Treaty had followed months of discussions among the Allies at the Paris Peace Conference, led by the 'Big Three' - Clemenceau for France, Lloyd George for Britain, and Wilson for the USA. The war on the Western Front had officially ended, but a series of smaller wars had erupted elsewhere on the fringes of an erstwhile peaceful continent of Europe.

On the signing of the peace treaties, victory parades took place that summer. Some people objected to exultant military parades and a number of ex-Servicemen even refused to participate.

Who Won the War?

The First World War was the turning point for America economically. With war orders flooding in from Europe, American manufacturers grew rich, and American industrial power began to lead the world. The international financial system set up its capital in New York during this period, and the war catapulted America forever into a leading role in worldwide economic and military affairs. As in the Second World War, Britain had to repay all the money owed to the USA, whereas the defeated nations, especially in the Second World War, were often supported by new US investment.

Reflections, June Thoughts.

June, glorious June! The time beloved of poets and romantic authors, when the sun shines, trees and bushes sprout fresh green foliage, and Cornwall, dear Cornwall is smothered in wild flowers from green alexanders through the yellows everywhere to the rosy glow of campion and valerian. The skeletons of trees are being clothed with greenery of all shades. God's Creation looks at its best, despite the frowns of weather forecasters and the rain-filled clouds rolling eastwards. We are lucky to be able to appreciate our countryside in the West Country.

Yet the year's zenith races towards us, seemingly ever faster as the years go by. Birthdays – yes another – race remorselessly towards us. With Easter still in our minds the féte and flower festival season is upon us already. It is easy, in our haste to keep abreast of the cataract of events, to lose sight of our individuality, our uniqueness. God knows each one of us in detail. As it says in the Committal of the Celtic funeral rite "Go forth to God, who flings the stars into the universe and yet knows when the smallest sparrow falls to earth". Our taste in music, general in some respects, is unique to each one of us, and is very much who we are.

Some cannot bear one form of music, and yet are devoted to another. For example a solo cellist may produce sounds that would alarm a passing vet, one generation may regard that of later generations as a deafening cacophony, and yet music has the power to enliven with its vivacity, emotion and rhythm. Worship without music is usually immeasurably the poorer. Music is such a vital part of our lives that it is impossible to imagine life without it. On November 22nd, we remember St. Cecilia, patroness of musicians, and the joy they have brought over the centuries. Yes, music is very much a part of God's Creation, and it reminds us of our unique relationship with our Creator.

At the end of the month we remember St. Peter and St. Paul on June 29th, the leaders of the Christian faith after Jesus' Ascension. On the previous day there will be an Ordination service at Truro, at which our dear friend Geraldine Ashton will be made a deacon. It will be the culmination of a long process of study, selection and training. A long path indeed. Please remember her and the other ordinands in your prayers.



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

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

bowled me over!


Although I was shocked And felt a bit mocked

Our Feathered Friends

Has anyone clocked this bird within our parish this year? Very doubtful? I tend to travel to Temple, Bodmin Moor, Crowdy, Rosenannon Downs or Goss Moor to see it. Blimey, given all my sites away now! I would like to go to the Scillies really as it's guaranteed to be seen.

I don't go crazy over adding this one but I do go 'Cuckoo.' Yes, it's everyone's spring monitor - the Cuckoo. Even non-birders ask "have you heard a Cuckoo this year." The Cuckoo arrives from Africa where they spend most of their lives. They migrate to the UK, arriving mid- to late-April and leave early after performing their deadly deed on unsuspecting smaller birds. Cuckoos are now monitored more successfully. Some are even fitted with tracking devices enabling their journeys to be checked as they head to and from Africa where they live in the equatorial forest for most of the year. The far-travelling 'Cu-Coo' male call is known to all and the call can travel some distance. The male also has a wheezy call too that can confuse. The female has a babbling, chuckling, trill that is guite un-Cuckoo to the ear.

The male Cuckoo is generally grey on the back and chest, with barring on a white belly. It is long-bodied with drooping wings at rest and a slender head.

The female is more buff-coloured on the neck, chest & underside, however there is a rarer, rufus-coloured female with black barring on the tail. Cuckoos are often mobbed by other birds in flight as they can resemble birds of prey, notably the Sparrow-

hawk. However, quick wing beats and the slender head raised, they often call in flight prior to landing on telegraph wire or a large bush.

It is quite amazing that this bird mates and the female lays her eggs in a host nest. Unsuspecting hosts such as Meadow Pipit, Reed Warbler, Dunnock, Tree Pipit, Pied Wagtail, and even Robins have their work cut out feeding this rather hungry, large and constantly begging open-mouthed young Cuckoo. The Cuckoo's egg hatches first and then gradually manages to heave all the original clutch of eggs over the side using its back, thus giving it sole attention of both foster parent birds.


The Cuckoo times its egg-laying to perfection to obtain the best chance for the young fledgling to survive. The female will lay directly into the host nest. The Cuckoo's egg has a large range of colours and marking that resemble the host's eggs.

Another amazing thing is that young Cuckoos migrate back to Africa purely by instinct as it has never met its natural parents!

My first sighting this Spring in Cornwall was at Goss Moor on the 30th April. I heard it first, and then (luckily) spotted it flying past the car. My partner Sharon's first sighting of the Cuckoo was the 'Cuckoo Gin' served in the local pub, well before mine. Cheers! Happy birding.

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


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St. Kew Community Gardens Association

The View from the Allotments and it's better late than never, where planting out is concerned.

For some time now we have been talking about planting out a lot of the stuff we grew in the greenhouse – partly because they needed to go out and partly because we could do with some space on the staging. The courgettes and 'Queensland Blue' pumpkins particularly wanted to get out and into the ground but we were convinced that they wouldn't last 24 hours in the cold wind and driving rain we've been having.

Anyway, a couple of weeks ago we put them into a sort of half-way house – the remains of a cold frame with no top on it. And now I've planted most of them out and prepared the ground for the remaining plants.

They are a bit leggy, which is only to be expected, but looking OK and I have put them fairly deep into the earth, with a surrounding bank to try to give them some protection from what my father used to call "the elephants". Fingers crossed. They were pretty good last year and we concentrated on the little yellow ones, which were excellent. The 'Queensland Blue' made wonderful soup.

Do you remember I wrote a couple of months ago about the scruffy broad beans I had planted last Autumn? Well, against all the odds, they have proved resilient and have already given us three good meals, with more to come. And in the meantime, the ones we planted out about six weeks ago are looking very strong and are covered with flowers. We do love our "broads" and expect to have quite a lot in the freezer for the Autumn.

At last I have weeded all the onions. I started to do them before we went on holiday for a week, and you can imagine what we came home to – chickweed, thistles, dock and goodness knows what else. Anyway, it took me several days as the old knees won't stand too much kneeling but the patch is now pretty clear. Now I have to start on the two wigwams of runner beans and the leeks AGAIN. In the greenhouse we have the next lot of leeks ready to transplant. It's worth doing as these leeks will be one of our staples during the Winter. In fact, we ate our last leek in the middle of May, which is pretty good going!

A follow up to our 250th Edition....

....in which we reprinted the cover of the June 1899 parish magazine which mentioned Jacob and Jane Stone and a Miss Benton. William has been doing some research:

JACOB AND JANE STONE

In St James the Great church, on the south wall there is a brass plaque: "To the glory of God and in memory of Jacob Stone, churchwarden 1916–36 and of Mary Jane Stone his wife. The Electric Light Installation was given to the church by their son Frederick H Stone 1949". It was in memory of Jacob's wife Mary Jane that their son installed the new lighting.

Jacob Stone was born at West Milton, Dorset in 1847 and Mary Jane Cocking was born in 1848 at St Neot. Jacob and Mary had the following children, all born at St Kew: John Roper born 1870, Maude Mary born 1871, Reginald Charles born 1873, Frederick Henry born 1875 and Arthur born 1880. The family lived for many years at Trequite Village.

Jacob was Head of the St Kew CP School 1868 – 1912 and Mary was Sewing Mistress. Jacob was not only the Headmaster, but was also a Churchwarden, choirmaster and organist (from which he retired in October 1905), and was a Parish Council Clerk. He was presented with a marble clock with bronze figures at Christmas after 37 years of faithful service.

Jacob died and was buried in the churchyard on 25th September 1940 aged 94; Mary Jane had pre-deceased him and was buried at St Kew on 11th February 1936 aged 87; Maude Mary, their daughter and a Pupil Teacher, died 30th August 1892 aged 21 and is also buried in the churchyard, on the left in the middle section.

MISS BENTON

The 1901 Census shows that a Kate Benton, aged 19, was born at Ilkeston, Derbyshire, and the records on the rest of her family are very interesting. Using census records 1891–1911 we find: Thomas, the father, a Stone Mason, and Catherine, the mother, had the following children: Kate, born 1881 at Ilkeston, George, born 1883 at Ilkeston, James, born 1886 at Launceston, William, born 1887 at Ilkeston, Julia, born 1890 at Ilkeston, Thomas, born 1894 at St Budeaux, Devon, twins Lily B and Daisy Evely, born 1896 at St Kew, and Mark Benton born 1899 also at St Kew. Thomas and his family obviously moved around the country going to where there was work.

The George Benton, of this Ilkeston-based family, who in 1911 was single and working as a journeyman House Joiner, is most certainly one of the 6 George Bentons listed on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) Roll of Honour. Five from the list can be eliminated as having absolutely no connection with St Kew, or Cornwall; however, the Ilkeston George Benton had a brother and 2 sisters born at The Rows, St Kew. As it was thought that perhaps one of his sisters might have married a local St Kew man research was carried out to check all the female marriages. Research shows that all the sisters married men local to Ilkeston. Further details of George's brother Mark cannot be traced. There is a strong possibility that the George Benton of this family is the one on the War Memorial, because he is the only one with a local connection. However, it is not known who recommended his name be placed on our War Memorial but one can guess it could be by one of his St Kew-born sisters, one of whom was Kate.

MIKE'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Fruit Tea Loaf

A very simple & very tasty recipe this month. Simple enough for the kids to make as well – under supervision of course. Makes 10-12 servings.

Ingredients

- Hot tea (1 or 2 tea bags steeped in 250ml of boiling water for 5 minutes of so). Any kind of tea will do but a full-flavour breakfast tea like Assam works best.
- 340g dried mixed fruit (I prefer the ones without candied peel)
- o 225g soft brown sugar
- o 280g self-raising flour, sifted
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1 tsp mixed spice
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- Knob of butter for greasing

- leave to soak for a few hours, ideally overnight.
- When you're ready to cook, pre-heat the oven to 150c/gas mark 2.
- Grease a 500g loaf tin and line with baking paper.
- Fold the flour, egg and spices into the fruit mixture and spoon/pour the mix into the tin.
 Don't worry if it looks a bit runny.
- Bake for around 1½ hours, until risen and coming away from the sides of the tin.
- Cool in the tin for 15 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely.

Best served in thick buttered slices with a nice cup of tea.

Perfect for summer picnics too - try it instead of scones with clotted cream and strawberry jam.

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LEST WE FORGET

For July/August 1919

Home Front.

In the wake of the War and demobilisation, the surplus of labour led to dissatisfaction among British workers, in particular seamen. During the year there was an outbreak of rioting between white and minority workers in Britain's major seaports. Along with Africans, Afro-Caribbean, Chinese and Arab sailors, South Asians were targeted because of the highly competitive nature of the jobs market and the perception that these minorities were 'stealing' the jobs that should belong to white indigenous British workers. In addition, during the year striking workers brought chaos to cities across the country and forced the government to use unprecedented force against its own citizens. The Army had to be called in because police officers were among those on strike. Soldiers were deployed to suppress disorder as fierce and violent riots involving British trade unionists and communist crowds wreaked havoc.

Peace Day 19 July 1919.



To celebrate and mark the end of WW1, a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday on 19 July 1919 was declared in Britain. Consequently, thousands gathered

in London and nearly 15,000 troops took part in the victory parade, led by Allied Commanders Pershing (Head of the US Expeditionary Force), Foch (Allied Supreme Commander), and Haig (British Commander-in-Chief). Bands played and the central parks of London hosted performances and entertained the crowds. Other celebrations organised by local authorities took place in cities, towns, and villages across the country. Each child received a Peace Mug which had on it displayed the main image of a white dove surrounded by flags of the friendly countries.

It was at the planning stage for Peace Day that Sir Edward Lutyens was asked to design a monument and had just two weeks to create a piece befitting a memorial for the fallen. The first memorial – the Cenotaph (which means 'Empty Tomb') was a temporary wood and plaster construction, another one made from Portland Stone was to replace it in 1920, which still stands today.



Unfortunately, during the planning stage, many veterans expressed their disgust at such extravagance, whilst they were still suffering the effects of their war experience.

Upon release from the military, soldiers found mass unemployment at home, and little appreciation for their sacrifice. Many had lost girl-friends

and wives to men that did not serve, their previous jobs taken and they found that businessmen got rich while workers remained as poor as ever. Many of the protesting men had been maimed, crippled or disfigured during the war. Pensions for these disabled men were meagre and no programmes to integrate them back into society were in place. Worse was to come in August.

On August Bank Holiday the government dispatched tanks to the northern city of Liverpool in an overwhelming show of force. The Royal Navy were also deployed to the parts of Merseyside which had come under siege from mobs the Army were unable to contain. Tanks were also brought onto the streets to crush worker's uprisings and impose martial law in Luton.

Other Military Commitments

Afghanistan. With all this going on in Britain, since May soldiers had been committed to what was the Third Anglo-Afghan War when Afghanistan invaded British India, which ended with an Armistice on 8 August 2019. The result was that Afghanistan won back control of their foreign affairs from Britain and Britain recognised Afghanistan as an independent country, and they agreed not to foment trouble on the British/India border.

Russia. It wasn't until October 1919 that British troops were withdrawn from the civil war in Russia. In 1918 a British force had been sent to Archangel to prevent Allied stores falling into Bolshevik or German hands, and to take pressure off the Western Front after the Treaty of Brest-Litovsk had taken Russia out of WW1. The evacuation of Murmansk in 1919, and the evacuation of Archangel two weeks previously, ended the British attempt to intervene on the anti-Bolshevik (white Russian) side in the civil war in northern Russia.



Reflections

The oldest concrete description of the cosmos found in the world is the Nebra Sky Disk found in Saxony, Germany, which is about three thousand two hundred years old. Analysis of the gold and bronze that it is made of show that both came from Cornwall. Trade, and therefore communication, has existed between Cornwall and Europe, especially the Mediterranean, for this long.

It is almost inconceivable that the new way of thinking and of life called "the way" and which we now call Christianity did not reach Cornwall until the first century AD, although by the very nature of these verbal communications no record exists.

This "way" was simply one of good relations with all, acceptance and inclusivity. It did not involve rules, judgement, or exclusion. If an act could be called

"loving" then it was fine. The well-off helped those less fortunate and the poor were not ignored.

The Saxons never fully controlled Cornwall after the Romans left so the tradition has probably been deeply ingrained in the Cornish culture since that time.

Wouldn't it be great to see those attitudes really break through again today?

How our Foodbank helps our community

Our Foodbanks cover Bodmin, Camelford, Wadebridge and Padstow and the surrounding rural areas.

Exciting news from the Foodbank....

We are delighted to announce that our Project Manager, Jacqui White, has been awarded an MBE. Jacqui is the founder of one of Cornwall's longest established foodbanks and has worked in the charity sector for over 26 years and used her own cash to kick start the Foodbank project with the help of Wadebridge Christian Centre. Over the past decade our foodbank, which covers a large section of North Cornwall, has distributed nearly 200 tonnes of food from its Wadebridge, Camelford and Bodmin locations, feeding the equivalent of 25,000 local people since 2009.

Sharon Angel, a family support worker at Beacon ACE Academy said: "In the current climate of cuts, it has become increasingly difficult to support families in crisis. We have turned to Jacqui for creative solutions, having confidence that her help and support is always immediate. She not only supplies food but also transport, household goods, money for shoes, coats, gas and electric. She always goes the extra mile and has cleaned homes, supported parents to find a solution to their current difficulties, signposted to debt management services and provided Christmas hampers. Not only has founder and manager Jacqui overseen the collection and

distribution of this food but she has physically processed much of it herself."

At 67, Jacqui still drives the foodbank van daily, clears collection points at local supermarkets, packs and delivers foodboxes and furniture, as well as looking after the accounts and overseeing the volunteer team and much of the administration. She said: "I was stunned and amazed when I found out. Five people in the area got together to put my name forward. It's nice to be appreciated but it's not all me. I have got an amazing team of 30 volunteers with me."

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
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

The View from the Allotments..... and there have been very few disappointments so far.

I can't believe it's been two months since my last update and you can imagine just how much has changed in that time. We have had such a mixture of weather too – one week we have been breaking our backs and shoulders, carrying cans of water back from the water trough to keep the seedlings watered and the next we're strengthening the runner bean wigwams against the wind and the rain. Well, this is Cornwall, after all. But when the temperature drops ten degrees from one day to the next, it is a little unsettling for the plants.

We have been enjoying our own produce for weeks now, with plenty more to come, and it is such a pleasure. It's not just the eating which is so satisfying (though a plate of fresh runners which were picked only half an hour before can't be beaten) but the actual physical picking and shelling and freezing give me so much satisfaction. I'm easily pleased!

Our peas have done very well this year and I now have a large bagful in the freezer, together with another bag full of broad beans. Now we're picking lovely little yellow courgettes and of course loads of runner beans which we take great pleasure in handing out to friends and neighbours. The father of an old friend of mine used to make a lunch out of the beans — a heap on a plate with a poached egg on top and a piece of bread and butter. Super.

Tony's greens suffered a bit from the wood pigeons, which pecked at the new young leaves, so he devised an obstacle course for them, by strewing bits of netting here and there across the plants. Result – no more pecked bits and the plants are now

developing well. The ones he planted earlier – cavolo nero and curly kale – have done really well and we have been cutting leaves for dinner for some weeks now.

After a shaky start, the tomatoes are doing well. You may remember that I/we/the weather killed off the original plants and I had to buy more. Anyway, now they are all covered in fruit and we have had the first few fruits off them, too. One plant I neglected to tidy up and let the side shoots run wild, with the result that I have a veritable tomato bush in the middle of the others. But that, too, is covered in fruit so I am not apologising.

The sweetcorn is developing its tassels, so within the next few weeks we shall see the cobs appearing. We had such a success with these last year, that I'm hoping for great things.

One failure and we can't understand why. The Queensland Blue squash never settled in and never grew. Don't know what happened, whether that patch of earth didn't suit or what. Shame, as they were prolific last year and spread all over the place. Very decorative. We shall have to be satisfied with the lovely yellow courgettes, which are very happy.

Nothing more to report, except that the onions and leeks are happy and healthy and almost ready for lifting (the onions, anyway – the leeks stay in the ground). Oh, and Tony has sown some kohlrabi seeds which are looking happy. We haven't done them for a few years and are looking forward to the crisp, peppery taste of this unusual brassica. AND the vine has grapes!

Police investigations are on-going.



Our Feathered Friends

"Pieces of eight", squawks the parrot from Treasure Island. Another treasure, apart from your magazine and the book is the 'Sea Parrot', that's Puffin to you and me. The Puffin has undergone a decline around the British Isles mainly due to its food source, particularly sand eels, being eradicated! They are however more common in Northern Britain, Wales and Ireland as opposed to here in the South West. This handsome looking bird has a place in our hearts with its multi-coloured bill and comical-looking 'clown eyes'. The Puffin measures approximately 28 - 34 cm, a small upright waddling bird with bright orange webbed feet and legs. Adults look splendid in their black and white attire, a white cheek patch and triangular red, yellow and grey bill, a dark back and white front. The eyes look sad in expression to me. The plumage tones down in the winter and the bill and face is much darker.

Puffins nest in burrows or cavities in the cliff earth and they also like slopes with vegetation hiding their burrows for added protection from predators. The species is confined to the North Atlantic and is a true sea bird, only coming to land in the spring to breed. Just a single egg is produced and the birds take it in turns incubating until hatched, then one parent takes over feeding the young 'Puffling'. A Puffin's bill can hold up to 20 sand eels in the groves of their bill so plenty to gorge on. The Puffling stays hidden underground and relies on being fed by the parents, until it is abandoned to force it to flutter down to the sea to feed itself!

Adult Puffins have a fast flight and perform circles around their breeding grounds, large rafts bob on

the sea and continue the flight to confuse predators such as Gulls and Skuas.

Nearby to our parish are popular tourist boat trips out to the Mouls at the Rumps to look for the small summer breeding colony. I prefer to watch from the cliff-tops through the spotting 'scope and have shown Puffins from a distance to delighted tourists as they walk the cliff path. The visitors are keen to see Puffins and other Auks such as Razorbills and Guillemots through the 'scope. Many walkers have commented on how the experience added extra special memories to their holiday, so yes, a popular bird is the Puffin.


I was pleased to see my first Puffins return on April 20th - four floating on the sea. A birder group counted eight later in the year. Puffins are still clinging on in our local area it would seem.

Recently a conservation group were attempting to raise funds to purchase large buoys to keep boats at a safe distance to avoid disturbance during the breeding season. I don't think enough has been raised to date, however the boats are sensible in their approaches.

So let's toast the Puffin - Perrys of Somerset make a fine cider bearing its name. Don't drink too much as you will be 'all at sea' just like the Puffin who spends most of its life far out at sea! Well I'm all out of puff for this article....

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

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chocolate fridge cakes

Just a very simple recipe to make with the children on a wet, wet holiday day.

Ingredients

- o 225g (8 oz) plain biscuits
- o 75g (3 oz) caster sugar
- 50g (2 oz) chopped walnuts
- o 50g (2 oz) glacé cherries, chopped
- o 2 level tsp instant coffee powder
- o 50g (2oz) butter
- 1 small tin evaporated milk
- o 2 medium eggs, beaten

- Break up the chocolate and slowly melt in a bowl suspended above simmering water
- Slowly heat the butter and evaporated milk together, taking care not to let the mixture burn.
- Combine the milk and butter mixture with the chocolate, then gradually stir in the eggs and mix well.
- Pour onto the biscuit mixture and mix thoroughly. Transfer to the prepared tin, smooth the top and refrigerate overnight.
- Keep in the fridge and cut as you wish.

Great with ice cream as a tea time treat.

Method

- Butter a cake tin or baking tray.
- Crush the biscuits finely in a plastic bag with a rolling pin.
- Mix the biscuits in a bowl with the sugar, cherries, walnuts and coffee powder.

Home-made Damson Gin

Damsons are in season now and this damson gin recipe makes the most of their tart plum-like flavours. It is incredibly simple and takes just a few minutes to make. The result is a deliciously heady fruity nectar that you'll love. The only downside is that you need to leave it for at least 3 months before drinking.

All you need is:

- 500g of damsons (if you don't have a friend with a damson tree The Vine greengrocers in Wadebridge has them now, but hurry as the season is short).
- 70cl bottle of gin fancy or expensive is a total waste of money (and good gin), cheap supermarket own label is perfectly fine.
- 100g caster sugar.
- A clean 1l Kilner jar.

Roughly halve or quarter the washed fruit with a knife - don't faff about pricking the fruit or removing the stones as some recipes suggest. Bung the fruit in the Kilner jar with the sugar and gin. Shake well every couple of days until the sugar has dissolved.

Leave for 3 - 4 months in a cool and, above all, dark cupboard. Using a funnel, strain the liquor through 3 or 4 layers of clean muslin into a sterilised bottle - the bottle the original gin came in is perfect. That's it - job done, but whatever you do don't throw the damsons away. Simmer them gently for 15 minutes or so with a couple of tablespoons of sugar, fish as many of the stones out as you can and finish off with your favourite crumble topping. Divine as a Boxing Day pud with clotted cream.

If you prefer a sweeter, more liqueur-like style by all means add more sugar - after a month or two simply taste occasionally and add a tablespoon of sugar each time until you get the right balance for you.

It is delicious as a winter warmer by the fire after a long bracing walk on the coast path, perfect on its own over ice, or with a quality tonic. My favourite is a chilled glass with a plate of Cornish cheeses, much better than port.



Reflections

Marcus Jones, children & Family worker, North Cornwall cluster of churches.

In Northern Ireland we have this delightful phrase "Catch yourself on," which is roughly translated as "don't be so ridiculous" but could be used to say "stop taking yourself to seriously" or as an interjector to bring reality and grounding to whatever a person is trying to communicate. I've always thought of it as a saying that can only be used between friends and doesn't intend to offend or hurt unlike its cousin "Wise up will ya?" that often stung as much as if you had been called a fool, idiot or "Ejit".

At home group we start with a prayer that includes the words "We are entering a special time... where we can be serious and stop taking ourselves too seriously... a time to be close to God." Getting close to God is serious business and a lifelong pursuit for many of us. However if we are too serious in our endeavours, and if we take ourselves too seriously we are at great risk of missing out on the life and joy promises by Jesus and worse still we may overshoot the mark and find ourselves at Jesus' displeasure!

I can quite imagine Jesus saying "Catch yourself on Martha, Mary's chosen the right thing to do and I won't be taking it away from her," or "Catch yourself on Zacchaeus, come down from that tree and we'll have tea at yours". I can also imagine Jesus saying to Simon the Pharisee "Wise up Simon will ya, and don't be so judgemental, let me tell you a wee story..." In different places and different guises this past month, I have heard the invitation to carry the phrase "Catch yourself on Marcus" around with me which I must admit has been very helpful when I can remember to use it before I say or do something.

In the North Cornwall Cluster of churches we will be looking at "Eating Together" as a Holy Habit. By it we are entering into a special time to be with God in all the seriousness of Christian discipleship and as we share in eating together we can begin to stop taking ourselves too seriously, we begin to catch ourselves on and we might even wise up a wee bit too. The great thing in all of this is discovering the life and joy just as Jesus has promised.

How our Foodbank helps our community

September 2019

Our Foodbanks cover Bodmin, Camelford, Wadebridge and Padstow and the surrounding rural areas.

Huge thanks to the Rotary Club of Wadebridge who continue to support us and kindly gave us a donation from their Wadebridge Wheels event.

It costs over £1,500 per month to run our Foodbanks in Wadebridge, Bodmin and Camelford and we rely on donations and funding to sustain the work we do. There is constant demand for emergency food in our community and we have fed equivalent to 841 local people in crisis since April and on average we provide approximately 1,800 meals per week.

In July we had a really interesting meeting with two ladies from Trading Standards, their presentation was entitled "Don't let your Gran be Scammed".

They gave us ideas for passwords - for example, rather than using something obvious like your maiden name, the name of your house or perhaps one of your children, instead take the first letter of each word of a song or book title eg We All Live In a Yellow Submarine could be WALIAYS then perhaps add a number at the front and at the end. No-one would guess which your favourite song was, so much more secure than something familiar.

We were also told about a call blocker system that Cornwall Council have, they bring a box to your house which connects to your phone line. My parents have been getting 2 or 3 nuisance calls an hour. On the day I made arrangements to have the box installed, Dad had been asked to put £367 in cash into an envelope and send recorded delivery, when he refused he was told that he would be prosecuted by the police and probably imprisoned.

Dad took their number and called the police himself. It was a scam! Just last week within our family I found out that someone had received a phone call saying that they were from the Fraud Team from their Bank, he was asked to confirm his address and they subsequently took out a bank loan in his name for £18,500, fortunately this has been dealt with by the Bank and they have stopped the re-payments for £505 each month. Again another scam. Please be careful and talk to someone from the WI if you would like any further information.

In September, we have a guided walk to Fowey with Lynne Gould who came to talk to us last year. It was such a wonderful evening, we are going to Fowey to explore with Lynne. If anyone would be interested in joining us then please give us a call.

Just in case the magazine comes out in time, we are holding a fundraising cake stall at the Garage on 24th August, with the funds being split between our group and Cornwall Hospice Care. Please support us come along, buy a cake or join in with our raffle!

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

EDITORIAL

Welcome to our October edition. We hope everyone has settled back into the old familiar routines after the summer. As the days draw in and we search for coats and scarves forgotten over the past months, we can smile at the traffic-free roads and the abundant parking spaces - always look on the bright side of life!

Looking on the bright side of life can be difficult, especially for those children and young adults with mental health issues and of course for their families. Many are unaware that mental health issues can affect younger people and the incidence appears to be increasing. That is why it is so fantastic that a new in-patient centre, Sowenna, has just opened in the grounds of Bodmin Hospital to help 13 to 18 year olds in a state-of-the-art facility where they can be looked after by a dedicated team. The £11m Sowenna Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) unit aims to provide a positive experience for these young people in an environment that tries to be as non-institutional as possible. There is accommodation for parents, an Invictus Café open to the public where friends and family can meet in a friendly space, a multi-purpose activity barn for team sports and performance arts, as well as an educational wing where music and art therapies are available. A crowd-funding appeal to create a therapeutic garden has raised over £12,000 to help provide much needed additional resources.

I went to the Open Day and was given a tour of the new building which is really impressive and promises to be one of the best of its kind in the UK. There has been input from young people as to what would be helpful to them and these ideas have been taken on board by the design team. Hopefully this will mean that Cornish youngsters will no longer have to travel outside the county in order to receive in-patient CAMHS care.

The Sowenna appeal continues as they still need funds to purchase the optional extras which will mean so much to the young people - take a look at their website www.sowenna.comwallft.nhs.uk or donate at www.justgiving.com/campaign/sowenna

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
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
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St. Kew Community Gardens Association

The View from the Allotments..... and as usual, the plots proved to be very productive, despite bad weather.

There was a point, earlier on in the year, when we did wonder whether we'd get any produce at all. We had high winds and gales, then just after I had planted out the tomatoes, we had a sharp frost and all but a couple collapsed and died. Then after we had planted out lots of tender seedlings, we had weeks of dry, sunny weather and were damaging our backs carting cans of water across from the tank to keep them going. It felt like a losing battle for a while, but the results we have seen over the past few weeks made all the work worth-while.

Our peas were super, our broad beans terrific, our runners prolific, our yellow courgettes delicious AND pretty to look at, our curly kale and cavolo nero magnificent and most unexpected of all, our potatoes are wonderful.

Long after potato-planting-time, I found a bag of supermarket potatoes in the back of a cupboard, all sprouting like mad. So I prepared a bit of ground and planted them all, heaping them up and whispering words of encouragement to them. We've been eating our own new potatoes now for several weeks, with lots more to come and I am thrilled to bits. How's that for a double-whammy on the recycling front — not only did I not throw them away, but they have grown again and are giving much more food than the original store-bought ones would have

done. Only trouble is, I haven't got a clue what type they are, so I can't replicate the result.

During the summer I have had the help of someone who lives locally and is doing the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. One of the requirements is to learn a new skill and together we have been working on 'vegetable growing'. In addition to learning how to identify different veg, he has helped by following individual crops from start to finish - planting leeks in deep holes, watering and weeding them and then lifting them and cleaning them for the pot. Weeding onions, then laying the stalks flat prior to lifting them and drying them out on newspapers in the greenhouse. Picking peas, then standing at the kitchen table, shelling them ready for the freezer. I think he has enjoyed the work and I have certainly enjoyed the help.

In the meantime, our local judge has been round the site, assessing individual plots for our annual Best-Kept-Allotment competition. It's actually not just 'best-kept' that he's looking for but also a large variety in the number of crops and also an indication of plenty of vegetables to be picked during the autumn and winter.

CHILDREN'S CORNER

How about making some delicious Marmite Snails one afternoon? They are super easy!




Ingredients

- o Ready-to-roll puff pastry.
- Marmite (or cheese if you don't like Marmite!)

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 200° C.
- o Dust the work surface with some flour and roll the pastry out to form a thin rectangle.
- Spread the Marmite over the pastry. Use as much or as little as you like.
- o Roll the pastry up starting from the wider side. It should look like a long sausage!
- o Brush the edge of the pastry with a little milk to help stick the edges together.
- Slice the pastry roll into 2 cm pieces.
- o Put them on a greased baking tray, making sure they are not too squashed as they will puff up!
- o Bake for 10-12 minutes until they are puffed and golden.
- They can be eaten warm (yum!) or cold (yum!)

If you hate Marmite you can sprinkle on grated cheese (press it down into the pastry a bit) and, instead of rolling it up, cut the pastry into 3 cm wide strips and twist them before putting them on the baking tray.

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

Our Feathered Friends

A cheerful song from a fast-flowing river or steam turns into quite a surprise when you spot the culprit! An over-sized Wren with flickering white eyelids and a white breast above a rusty band under belly, a chocolate brown back and sides with stumpy tail reveals the 'Dipper'. This aquatic bird is resident in the UK and can be found on fast-flowing rivers and streams across Cornwall.

The Camel river on the way towards Bishops Wood from the Camel Trail, Camelford town from the bridge on both sides, and Boscastle's Valency valley are hot-spots for seeking out this handsome bird if you are lucky. They can be quite tricky to spot as they fly up and down the watercourse on quick whirring wings or are hidden on the banks. The Dipper is about 18 cm long and has a constant bobbing habit, as if it's on a small spring. The song has a varied very loud trill and whistle. The flight call (a loud rasping single high pitched note) can also give this bird away as it makes its way low over the water.

They nest in crevices and under bridges, in holes within the stone or brickwork, or within large boulders. The domed nest is made of moss, grass and leaves. White eggs are normally laid in two or three clutches, and can contain 4 - 6 eggs. Dippers are one of the early breeders.

A Dipper will belt out its song in winter from a vantage point such as a rock or branch across the water to claim their stretch of river territory. They are


always found near fast-flowing water as they feed on aquatic invertebrates. Dippers amazingly feed underwater, turning over stones and shingle to seeking them out. The wings help push the bird downwards and under the fast currents where they can walk on the bottom, gripping stones with their claws (that also allow them to stand in the fast currents), prior to letting go to bob back up to the surface.

They are very active when feeding hungry broods, and are a pleasure to watch if you stumble across a nest site. Usually the Dipper is very prone to disturbance and can quickly take flight, however a single bird feeding in the shallows (as opposed to being submerged) seen at Camelford last summer was too busy feeding to be frightened - which allowed my granddaughter Shelby and I good views from the bridge, totally unaware of our presence! She proudly announced a new bird name for Cornwall when she went home announcing we had seen a 'dunker'!

Remember it's always worth looking out for the Dipper if you are walking near fast-flowing water around Cornwall. You may also spot the handsome Grey Wagtail, a cheery bright yellow and grey bird that frequents fast-flowing water - a neighbour of the Dipper, however not confined totally to this particular habitat and a constant fidget too! This wagtail also occasionally visits our garden!

Something which has been raised with me is dental provision across the whole of Cornwall. A lack of NHS dental care in Cornwall is a historical issue which has not been properly addressed by successive governments; I have been keen to do my part to solve it since my election four years ago.

I am aware that NHS dental patients in Cornwall have found it difficult to get an appointment for a check-up, routine dental work or children's orthodontics and this is something I and my fellow Cornish MPs are treating as a priority.

At a recent meeting chaired by Truro & Falmouth MP Sarah Newton, which I attended with my staff, local dentists and NHS representatives were able to discuss both the problems and the solutions to issues surrounding dentistry in Cornwall. Following on from this meeting I met directly with dentists who provide services to NHS patients here in North Cornwall. These meetings have allowed all the relevant parties to voice their opinions and suggestions on how government can better support practitioners and patients.





GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

French Apple Cake

Ingredients

- 110g soft unsalted butter
- o 2 tsp vanilla essence
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tbsp rum (optional)
- o 120g self-raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- o pinch of salt
- 2 peeled & cored cooking apples, chopped
- Granulated sugar for sprinkling over the cake

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 180° C, and line a medium- sized cake tin with baking paper.
- Combine the butter, salt, sugar & vanilla and beat until creamy.
- Add one egg at a time, beating until combined.
- Add the rum, flour and baking powder and beat again.

- Add the chopped apples to the batter and fold in gently.
- Spoon the mixture into the cake tin and smooth the top.
- Sprinkle with 1-2 tbs sugar.
- Bake for 40 minutes or until it comes clean when tested with a toothpick.
- Allow to cool completely before slicing and serving.

Delicious served with creme fraiche, pouring cream or double cream, or all three if you're very greedy!

The question of whether St Kew should have a neighbourhood plan or not was discussed and it was decided to invite someone from Cornwall Council to a special meeting. The meeting will be held in the Community Hall at St Kew Highway on 19th November at 7.30pm. Anyone who is interested in what is built or what St Kew will look like in the future, should come along and help protect and shape the parish of St Kew for years to come.

Rubbish collection is about to change. In June 2021, we will be getting a weekly recycling collection and a fortnightly black bag collection. Wheelie bins will be provided by Cornwall Council and they will only collect what is in the bins. New recycling bins will also be available for food waste and other waste not as yet recycled. When more details are available, we will publish them.

We have had reports of dog "poo bags" being left in fields and on the edge of footpaths, some even tied to the hedges and gate posts! Cattle and dogs can contract Neosporosis. Neosporosis is dangerous to RG

all livestock, causing abortion in livestock, illness in adult dogs and death in young puppies.

While dog faeces left in farmers' fields isn't just unpleasant and a danger to his livestock, wildlife and other dogs, it is also an offence with up to a £1000 fine, to not dispose of poo bags properly.

The answer is bag it and take it home or dispose of it in the appropriate bin.

We would like to welcome Mr Tony Prophet who was co-opted on to the council, we still have a vacancy for one more member, so if anyone would like to come onto the council, please contact our clerk. We look forward to Tony's input at our meetings.





EDITORIAL

This autumn it's been a joy to find such a glorious blackberry crop! Nature's bounty can surprise and, combined with Bob and Jean Plater's windfalls, we now have jam in abundance. Many lanes locally are allowed to grow, but that's not always the case, and it's disappointing to see so many newly-flailed hedges in the parish. Often they've been hacked into square box-shapes, with the trees and bushes lacerated. Farming practices have changed a lot since I was a kid in Cornwall, carrying our milk home still warm from the milking-parlour, but reading the award-winning nature-writer, Mark Cocker ('Our Place', 'Birds and People'), I was reminded of how much wildlife is supported in a comparatively small patch of ground - 50 species or more, including bumblebees, damselflies, ladybirds, beetles, hoverflies, butterflies, grasshoppers, (the list goes on), all thriving in one un-mown patch of ground. And all these insects provide food for a rich multitude of bird-life. The newly-published State of Nature Report (National Trust), highlighted how many species are in decline in the UK with some in threat of extinction, including hedgehogs, hares, bats, and birds like the turtle dove and willow tit.

For my birthday treat last November I saw the brilliant folk-singer, Chris Wood, in concert at Lyme Regis: one of his songs that night, from his CD 'So Much To Defend' is called 'The Flail':

'The flail came by today

Took away the things that took so long to grow Before it went away....

Knocked us back to where we all were years ago Before it went away...'

This reminded me of Joni Michell's singing in 1970: 'Don't it always seem to go that you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone'.

The situation can seem to be overwhelming, but, as Rosie Hails of the National Trust reminds us, 'we can do our *own* bit, including nature-friendly planting in our backyards.' If that sounds like 'Think globally, act locally', there's still time to plant for the spring. I'm starting small with tulips, crocuses, and Christmas roses. Maybe I'll surprise my chief gardener this year!

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
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
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St. Kew Community Gardens Association

The View from the Allotments.... and mixed feelings, really, this month.

We're thrilled to bits to be awarded second prize for our allotment, as we really have had a huge variety of produce past, present and future at the allotment. But we are gutted because our brassicas, which are usually a stalwart throughout the Winter, seem to have failed.

We planted early cavolo nero and curly kale and had a couple of months when they were really prolific and we were using them and giving away bags full and so on. But then, out of the blue, we had an infestation of caterpillars. I never saw any butterflies landing on the plants but suddenly, nearly all the leaves were stripped bare. Can't understand it. For two or three years now we have grown these brassicas without any predators taking over. So what happened? Did a new strain of butterfly find them? Don't know. And to add insult to injury, the purple sprouting and sprouts which we had planted later nearby have also suffered. First from collared doves, pecking at the fresh green leaves, and then from another sort of caterpillar. So we are at a loss.

Usually, we depend on our greenery to keep us going through the Winter months, together with the leeks and parsnips. And all the peas and beans we have put in the freezer, too, of course. But this is not looking too good this year. We went searching in various nurseries and garden centres and found some leftover chard, which we have planted out. And we've got some seedlings coming on at home on the windowsill but are not too hopeful. It's a bit late to start anything fresh.

We must look on the bright side, though and our tomatoes have proved wonderful after a very shaky start. We've given a lot away but now the outdoors ones have succumbed to the wet and miserable weather and most of the fruit left on the plants are blackened and probably not good for anything. The ones in the greenhouse at home, though, are brilliant and I expect to have plenty more coming over the next couple of months. And any extras, I shall peel and put in a box in the freezer for sauces and stews.

The leeks are wonderful and our sweetcorn are again proving a delight. I have picked and shucked (is that an American term?) about thirty cobs and put them in the freezer and we have eaten several, too. They are not anything like "boughten" ones – very sweet and tender, and all the better for being from one's own allotment.

And as for the onions – they are all dried out, put into nets and hanging from hooks in the garage and as good a crop as we've ever had. We use so many onions, in our cooking, and it's good to report that we used our last "own" onion at the end of April this year. And looking at the nets in the garage, I think it will be the same again. Planting and watering and weeding is a bit labour intensive but by golly, it's worth it!

We shall have a few plots available for the coming year, so do get in touch if you are interested. We ourselves may be giving up one of our own, or perhaps half of one, so if you would like a "starter" plot, let us know at our AGM on 31st October, at the Red Lion Inn.

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Our Feathered Friends

A clear blue sky on a sunny day and a loud mewing from above attracts your attention. No its not a cat on a parachute, it's the Common Buzzard.

Buzzards drift effortlessly across the sky enjoying the thermals, if it is not being mobbed by corvids and seagulls that is. Several Buzzards can soar on the up-currents, wheeling around and gaining height on broad wings. The Common Buzzard is living up to its name as they are quite numerous around the country and indeed our parish. We have several spotted and calling from above Pendoggett and indeed there are usually at least two on the telegraph posts heading down to St Kew, perched either resting or keeping an eye out for unsuspecting prey. They were more common a couple of decades ago on uplands however have spread their wings so to speak and now find lowland agricultural and woodland quite as pleasing.

They hold their wings in shallow V with head looking down to check for prey, mostly feeding on small mammals and road-kill should they be fortunate.

You can also spot Buzzard's resting in fields or waddling after the plough with gulls looking for grubs. The Buzzard, like other bird of prey species such as Red Kite and Peregrines, have enjoyed a recovery thanks to no longer being exposed to farm chemicals such as DDT. This reduced numbers vastly in the 1950/60's which harmed breeding. Buzzards also like rabbits and again they suffered when myxomatosis disease was at its height!

The Buzzard has a wing span that is quite broad and it is typically mottled-brown with a barred belly,

however it is fun to spot other plumage types that can range from very dark to very pale thus making it a challenge.

The Common Buzzard can hover occasionally but not as often as its close relative the Rough-Legged Buzzard from Scandinavia, and an occasional visitor to Cornwall. This is a pale Buzzard mainly on head and breast, with a larger, paler underwing! Who said birding was easy?

Common Buzzards nest in a large tree fork or deep ledge on hillsides or cliffs. The nest is a messy affair of twigs, roots & branches, lined with wool, moss, grass, etc. One clutch is laid in late April to early May, usually 2 to 3 eggs in various shades of mottled browns and greens, with a pattern unique to each female. I am sure they have followed the motorway corridors with their handy roadside habitat to then fly on and discover pastures new as they soar high, wide and proud and far over the country seeking out food on the go and a mate in tow.


Next time see how many Buzzard's are soaring up in the sky at one time, my record count over Pendoggett is six!

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

In October we competed in the first round of the Winter League Competition at Lansallos Church against Lostwitheil and Roche. We won the round and gained 3 points on the table.



GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chicken with lemon and thyme, with rosemary potatoes.

Ingredients

- 4 whole chicken legs, or 8 chicken pieces
- o 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- Small bunch of fresh thyme
- o 6 tbsp olive oil
- o 1 large lemon, thickly sliced
- o 200ml (7fl ozs) chicken stock
- 120ml (4fl ozs) drv white wine
- o 20 black olives, stoned
- Freshly chopped parsley

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 200C/400F or gas mark
- Cut the chicken legs in at the joints and cut away any fat.
- Mix the oil, garlic, and about a tablespoon of leaves from the thyme. Season well.
- Add the chicken pieces and coat well & transfer to a roasting tin.
- Place the lemon slices on top and roast for 30 minutes.

- Pour the chicken stock and wine over, add the olives and continue to roast for a further 20 minutes.
- Lift the chicken pieces onto warmed plates and rapidly boil the juices to reduce a little.
- Pour the juices over the chicken and scatter the remaining parsley over.

Serve with rosemary potatoes:

- 1-2 lbs potatoes, peeled
- Salt
- 3-4 cloves garlic
- 6 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 3 sprigs of rosemary
- Heat the oven 200C/400F or gas mark 6.
- Cut the potatoes into small chunks, cover with water and cook for 5 minutes.
- Drain well and turn into a roasting pan. Add the garlic, oil and rosemary spikes from 2 rosemary sprigs, mix them all together well.
- Bake for 35-40 minutes until crisp and brown.
 Transfer to a serving dish.
- Chop remaining rosemary spikes and scatter over potatoes and serve with the chicken.

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LEST WE FORGET

November 1919

The First Remembrance Day – 11th November 1919

The armistice of 11th November 1918 had effectively ended the Great War; however, the conflict was only concluded with the signing of the peace treaties in June 1919 and victory parades took place that summer. Yet some objected to exultant military parades, and a number of ex-servicemen even refused to participate. As a result, the first Remembrance Day ceremonies were commemorative rather than triumphant.

Two features of that first Remembrance Day on 11th November 1919 are central to commemorations today: the Cenotaph in Whitehall, London, and the silence. Alongside the official ceremonies, huge crowds gathered to lay wreaths at the newly-erected Cenotaph, designed by Sir Edward Lutyens. This was a day of mourning, not celebration. The Cenotaph was the place around which people united – and the activity that united them was the two minutes of silence. On King George V's initiative, people were asked to remain silent at 11am, to cease activity and stand with heads bowed, to think of the fallen. The silence was announced by church bells – and it was universally observed.

Everything and everyone stopped: buses, trains and factories halted, electricity supplies were cut off to stop the trains and, whenever possible, even the ships of the Royal Navy were stopped. Workers in offices, shops, hospitals, and banks stood still. Schools became silent. Law Court proceedings came to a standstill, as did the stock exchange.

Subsequent Remembrance Days

Other Remembrance Day traditions developed quickly. In November 1920 the Unknown Warrior was brought from Boulogne on board HMS Verdun. The funeral procession moved on to London and the Cenotaph.

The grave of the Unknown Warrior is in the west end of Westminster Abbey. The grave also contains soil brought from France and is covered by a slab of black marble from Belgium. The slab bears an inscription written by Herbert Ryle, then dean of the



Abbey, which memorates the "many multitudes" who died during WW1. "They buried him amongst the kings because he had done good toward God and towards his house." From 1921, artificial poppies, made former soldiers, were sold to support the Earl Haig fund for ex-servicemen. After WW2 it became traditional to hold Remembrance

Day on the nearest Sunday to 11th November. It was only in 1996 that the two minutes silence was reinstated on the actual 11th day of November.

One Hundredth Anniversary



Although there will be the usual Remembrance Sunday service held at the War Memorial, following the morning service of worship at 10.30 Sunday 10th November at St

James the Great church at St Kew, the hundredth anniversary of the first Remembrance Day will be on Monday 11th November and the volunteer bell ringers of St James the Great church plan to ring at 11am – work permitting.

Poetry Reflective Day, 2nd November



Holy Habits

Our churches are exploring something called "Holy Habits" at the moment. We are trying to grow in how we live out our faith by spending time with each of 10 Holy Habits over a two year period. We have thought about the fairness of how we share food in our world today and - my favourite - we have enjoyed eating together with children from St Kew, Port Isaac and St Minver schools who have come to our churches for the "Experiencing Harvest" programme.

I hope that as we continue with the other Holy Habits, Eating Together will be something that we continue to do, and that in our eating together we will find a place at the table for the God who has provided us with such an amazing world, and who loves us so much that he has come to meet us in Jesus.

The next Holy Habits we will be exploring - in November and December - are "Gladness and Generosity". So as we continue to eat together, I hope that we will also find we can grow in joy and in giving whatever we can for the good of others.

Looking forward to seeing you there on the night.









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

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
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

The View from the Allotments..... and all I can see is driving rain

Do you remember that Crystal Gayle song from ca. 1978, which had the lines: "I've had enough of this continual rain I'm ready for the times to get better" Well, Crystal, I'm with you! It seems as though we're fighting a losing battle. We have one dry day and can't do anything anyway, because the ground is too heavy, then back comes the rain for the next three days.

The plots look really forlorn and neglected (ours, anyway, as some of our members have made strenuous efforts to tidy up and turn over their patches). But this is the time we should be lifting all the old brassica roots and the maize stalks and outdoor tomatoes. But all I'm doing at the moment is going round to lift a few leeks and parsnips for the table and then belting back home through the RAIN!

In fairness, I have done a little bit of work and stacked the glass panels we had used for the tomatoes. But I need a few consecutive days when I can tackle a whole patch ready for rotavating.

We had a lot of grapes on the one vine we planted three years ago and the other three are looking sturdy and happy. The grapes were too sour to use as fruit, so I boiled them down with some water, added lots of preserving sugar and made a grape jelly. It's still a bit sharp but would go very well with pork, I think – must try it next time we have roast loin of pork on a Sunday.

We had a successful AGM at the Red Lion Inn on 31 October, with members representing 14 plots in attendance. The committee was voted in again unchanged – don't know whether it's inertia or overall unwillingness to change! Whatever, we shall soldier on for another year.

Anyway, for now let's just say, forget Crystal Gayle – has anyone got a **crystal ball** to tell me what the weather's going to do for the next few weeks!!

We have a few plots available for the coming year, so do get in touch if you are interested. We ourselves may be giving up one of our own, or perhaps half of one, so if you would like a "starter" plot, let us know.



CHILDREN'S CORNER

HO! HO! HO!



How about making this Maltesers Christmas Pudding. It is deliciously fun and really easy-peasy to make. Have a go!

Ingredients

- 125g self-raising flour
- o 125g golden caster sugar
- o 125g butter leave it out of the fridge for a time so it gets soft
- 40g cocoa powder
- ½ tsp baking powder
- o 3 fresh eggs
- o 6tbsp chocolate buttercream icing
- 300g Maltesers
- o 100g white chocolate, melted
- A few cranberries and a couple of bay leaves

Method

Put the flour, sugar, butter, cocoa, baking powder and eggs into a bowl and mix until it is light and fluffy. Pour into a greased pudding basin and bake for 45 minutes at 180° c or until a skewer comes out clean. Leave it to cool on a wire rack. Turn the pudding basin over onto a plate and tap the basin so that the cake pops out. Cover the cake with buttercream. Stick the maltesers all over the cake and pour the melted white chocolate over the top. Decorate with some bay leaves and cranberries to make it look like a Christmas pudding.

Having brought her outfit and makeup, and despite the weather, she was determined to carry out her trick-or-treat with a difference.



What is a 'Blue Christmas' service?

From the middle of November, shops, media and advertising collude to convince us that Christmas is magical, full of joy and fulfilment. Cares are banished and laughing children reinforce the message that sadness and anxiety have no place in the festivities.

But what if bereavement and loss mean that sorrow is the overwhelming emotion felt at Christmas? How do we observe it then? 'Blue Christmas' is an American service specifically designed for those whose mood is 'blue' in this season. We will be running an Anglicised version to meet the needs of those who feel on the edge of seasonal merriment for whatever reason, or for those who would prefer a quiet, reflective service.

The service itself is very simple – selected verses of a carol and readings to narrate the Christmas story; prayers which acknowledge pain and emptiness alongside the Christian hope; and reflections which gently speaks of light in darkness. The service has

times of silence, not rushing to fill every moment with word or song and candles are lit at various points throughout the service.

It's our privilege to offer a space where the reality of life with its grief and pain does not have to be left at the church door but can sit alongside the hope and light which is the real heart of Christmas.

Refreshments will be served at the end.

This service will take place on Sunday 22nd December at 3pm at St. Endellion Church. Everyone will be warmly welcomed.

NICHOLAS THOMAS EVERY

On the 4th December 1915, the Reverend Nicholas Thomas Every died and is buried in the parish church. Born at St Veep, he gained a BA at Clare College, Cambridge in 1850, ordained deacon (Exeter), and was appointed vicar of St James the Great church at St Kew on 10th February 1852 and was therefore vicar for 64 years. It is believed that at the time he was the longest-serving parish priest in the country.

In 1851 he was a curate and living at Trequite in a house owned by Jane Curgenven. He married a church worker Ann Eleanor Louis at Newton Abbot and in 1861 is recorded as living at the vicarage (Trescobel) with his wife, groom, cook and housemaid. Ten years later Nicholas's mother was living at Trescobel and also his brother John James Glencross Every, a Royal Navy Chaplain, who was helping him in the parish.

Nicholas Every's wife Ann died in 1907 and is buried in St James church. According to the Parish Magazine (January 1908) the burial service "will long be remembered for the reverent way it was carried out, both by the choir and the large congregation present, and the feeling of Peace, which was felt all through."

By the church organ is a brass plaque in memory of his wife "who amongst other good works beautified this church. 2nd March 1908." The organ was installed in 1903 by the Revd Nicholas in the south chapel and moved to its present position between 1927 and 1935.

John James Glencross Every had been a parson at Lanhydrock where he was buried on 21st February 1913. JJG married Ada Ruth, the second daughter of Sir Harry Onslow, of Hengar, and he was to rebuild Newton, now Lanarth, and became a Prebendary at St Endellion church (Marley's Stall). JJG's son Henry Onslow Every was born at St Kew 1875, and became a curate assisting his uncle Nicholas Every 1903-1909, and was known as Mr

Harry throughout the parish. Mr Harry sadly died 14th May 1911 and is laid to rest beside his family at Lanhydrock.

In the 1900s Nicholas Every instigated the building of an Institute on Glebe land at St Kew Churchtown so that young men of the parish could continue meeting. By 1910 a building was erected, entirely financed and built by these young men with assistance from local individuals and farmers. opened 29th March 1911. It was used by many parish organisations and as a reading room and games room. However, over time it was used less and less until it was closed. Being Glebe property, the Diocese sold it in the 1960s and is now a privately owned home. In 1906 Nicholas Every had erected at Amble a school for infants and for other church purposes with help from subscribers. He is also credited with building, in 1890, a protection for the Holy Well at Trescobel.

In the church sanctuary at the right of the altar is a beautiful stained glass window dedicated "To the glory of God and in memory of Ann Eleanor the beloved wife of Nicholas Every, priest, by whom with his parishioners this window was erected as a thank-offering in the 60th year of his Vicarage AD1911."

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Lemon Polenta cake

Ingredients

- 500g butter, softened
- 500g caster sugar
- Finely-grated zest of 3 lemons & 1 orange
- o 6 large eggs, beaten
- Juice of 3 lemons & 1 orange
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 500g ground almonds
- o 300g polenta
- 2 tsp baking powder
- Icing sugar to dust

To serve

- 500g mascarpone cheese
- 175g icing sugar
- 3 tbsp fresh lemon juice

Method

- Lightly oil two 20cm loose-bottomed cake tins and line the bases with baking parchment.
- Preheat the oven to gas 4 or 180°c.
- Cream the butter and caster sugar until light and fluffy.

- Add the lemon and orange zest, mix well & add the beaten eggs slowly.
- Add the juices, vanilla essence, ground almonds, polenta and baking powder. Stir well until the ingredients are thoroughly mixed.
- Divide the mix equally between the tins and tap each tin gently to ensure there are no bubbles.
- Bake for 40 minutes, then reduce the temperature to gas 3 or 160°c & continue to cook for 40 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the cake comes out clean.
- Allow the cakes to cool in the tins.
- Beat the mascarpone, icing sugar and lemon juice together and chill until required.
- Carefully transfer the cakes to a serving plate, spread some of the lemon mascarpone mix over one cake, put the other one on top and dust with icing sugar. Serve with a further dollop of lemon mascarpone.

Biffa and, all in all, a tremendous turnout of 30 people. Wow.



Reflections

"Time, like an ever-rolling stream, bears all its sons away"

That line is from "Our God, our help in ages past", written by Isaac Watts in 1708. It paraphrases Psalm 90, which was written a millennia ago. It seems that over 300 years ago, people then felt the speed at which life seems to sweep us along. So the feeling for some of us of a certain age, that there are at least two Christmases a year and probably more, is not to be wondered at. Think about it – a fifth of the 21st century has already gone! Yet when we were in our teens, life could drag terribly, when we wanted to get on with life, to succeed, and to achieve. Those of us of that certain age had to cope with National Service, two years largely wasted, feeling like ten.

By the time this is read, life might be about to be rather different, perhaps very different. For are we not having a General Election before Christmas? And the associated dilemma, which I refuse to mention, might soon be settled, perhaps? Or not? Exciting, if not something of a black cloud which hangs over us at a time when we are preparing to celebrate with our families and friends.

The real meaning of Christmas is often lost beneath the rush to buy food, presents, decorations, and, oh yes, the winter ski-ing holidays coming soon afterwards. Then there are the appeals to help those without - without a roof over their heads and even a friend to pray for them.

Schools, at least the primary schools, celebrate, and the Nativity play is enjoyed by children and parents alike. Christmas, the Nativity, was the greatest event in history. If God had not come to live as a human being, born to Mary in Bethlehem, there would be **no** Christian faith, at least as we know it, whatever else might have happened. No Christmas, no Easter, no Church – it's as simple as that. Jesus was conceived spiritually, in a way we cannot understand, but he grew to become a wandering teacher who performed deeds which were impossible. That is why we call them miracles. Yet he was born to a human mother, which made him as human as we are.

His short ministry of teaching has given our lives values to aspire to and be guided by. In particular at this time we need to remember that Jesus, although a Jew, welcomed and healed people of **all** races, such as the servant of a Roman centurion, the son of the Syrian woman, the epileptic of Gedara, the woman of Samaria, the Greeks who sought him, as well as the people of Lebanon and east of Israel.

So while all of us in the North Cornwall group of churches wish you a happy and blessed Christmas, please spare time to dwell on the real importance and meaning of the Nativity in our lives and the lives of those we love.

May God be with us all, as we prepare to enter 2020.


